## Riverside Flying School Abandoned

Riverside, Cal., Sept. 1.—Aviation training activities at March Field, near here, have been discontinued with the recent graduation of twenty-six cadets and four officers, Captain F. I. Eglin, commandant, announced.

New plans call for the transferring of cadets of the observation classes to Fort Sill, Okla., and of those of the bombing pursuit science classes to Kelly Field, Texas. These arrangements will leave thirty officers and 230 enlisted men at March Field, which soon will be put on a storage basis, according to advices from the War Department.

Gasoline has been received for forest patrol work, and it is believed a few of the men will be kept here on that duty until November. During the war, 1500 men were stationed at March Field.

BIG FEET  
Venice, Cal., Aug. 30.—Girls with large feet make the best swimmers, it is asserted by Tom Kendall of the Venice Swimming Association. He told a number of girls who wished to learn to swim that big feet were great aids in propelling swimmers rapidly and safely through the water.

"I don't mean feet so large they are awkward, but feet that are as they ought to be—in proportion to the remainder of the body," he explained. "Anyone who swims knows how helpful it is to have good-sized flippers."

## ORGANIZE CHURCH

Mexicali, Lower Cal., Sept. 1.—The Chinese Church of Christ was recently organized here at a meeting attended by four hundred Chinese, and a school of religious instruction was also initiated as a feature of the work.

Stephen Mark, a California-born Chinese, who is a graduate of the University of California and was an officer in the world war, was the missionary who organized the new church. It was financed in part by some American women, but chiefly by the Chinese themselves. Business men of Mexicali, and its twin-city, Calexico, on the American side of the line, have aided in putting the church on a sound footing.

## PRACTICAL WORK IN JOURNALISM

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 1.—When the University of Southern California resumes its classes this month, students of journalism again will have opportunity to get out regular editions of daily newspapers and other publications in and near Los Angeles, according to the plans of Marc N. Goodnow, head of the department of journalism.

Last year the students did all the work incident to publishing some 15 daily papers in Southern California, taking charge in each instance for one day. Papers were published at San Bernardino, Riverside, Santa Ana, Venice and numerous other cities. Each time the regular editorial and business force moved out, and the students moved in, for the day of publication.

In discussing the plan, Mr. Goodnow stated that an advertising crew of students is sent in about a week in advance of publication day. The crew works up special advertising, and does the routine work of the advertising department.

A day before the publication date, two or three students go to work at the newspaper office on society and sports copy, and prepare that and other "early copy" for the printers. Then, the morning of publication day, the reporters, re-write men, copy readers and others step aside, and students take their place. The students have a managing editor, editorial writer, telegraph editor and as many other heads of departments as the size of the paper makes customary. The student reporters cover the usual beats and assignments, and work up special stories. The regular force takes a day-off, except that one department head remains on hand to make up the paper, and lend advice in matters of purely local import.

"We are not out to boost the university, so much as we are out to obtain practical experience, so we try to put out the paper just as we would if we were on the payroll," said Mr. Goodnow.

Editors and the public take kindly to the innovation, Mr. Goodnow said, and its effect on the interest of the student and in causing increased enthusiasm for newspaper work has been marked. The journalism course of the university recently has been advanced, so that two years of preliminary work are required, the technical courses of the work being assigned to junior and senior years.

## Volume of Trade Greater Than Last Year, S. F. Stores

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 1.—The dollar value of sales of 30 representative department stores and mail order houses in the 12th federal reserve district during July declined 12.9 per cent, compared with July, 1920, according to John Perrin, chairman of the board and federal reserve agent. Mr. Perrin, said, however, that present retail prices were reported to average 20 per cent less than in July of last year, and the value of the average sale was reported by 11 stores as 16.3 per cent less, indicating that the physical volume of trade continues to be greater than it was a year ago.

The amount of the average sale reported by 11 firms was \$2.30 in July, compared with \$2.52 in June, and \$2.75 in July, 1920. Collections were said by 13 firms to be good, but 11 others characterized them as only fair.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 1.—A rodeo and roundup at which every parlor of the Native Sons of the Golden West in northern California has been asked to assist will be held in San Francisco September 9, 10 and 11, as part of the celebration of the admission of California to the Union 71 years ago. The proceeds will be applied to the Native Sons' Athletic club building fund.
