Housing Shortage Hits State Prison

SIOUX FALLS, S. D., Sept. 10—The housing shortage has reached the South Dakota Penitentiary. Built to accommodate 216 prisoners, the institution is now caring for 201, with the prospect of approximately 160 more being added by the first of the year from the fall terms of circuit courts.

An old shirt factory, which has been in disuse for years, is being remodelled into a cell dormitory, which according to Warden George Jameson, will take care of the expected increase in the prison population and a number of trustees are being housed in outbuildings both inside and outside the prison walls, and on the prison farm a mile away until the converted factory building is ready for occupancy.
