Inspection Trip Made Over Project Today

This morning H. D. Newell, United States reclamation project manager, and A. L. Wishard, secretary of the Klamath Irrigation district left for an inspection tour of the valley, both on the old projects and on some of the new ones under contemplation.

This inspection trip will be in the general nature of a checking up of all the water system and also to observe the general condition of the main canals and laterals.

Woman Warden at Bay State Election

HAVERHILL, Mass., Sept. 16.—A woman presided over one of the voting precincts in this city at today's special primary election. This is recorded by officials as the first instance of a woman serving as warden at an election in Massachusetts.

The pioneer woman warden, Mrs. Ida A. T. Stevens, has previously officiated several times at the polls as an inspector. She will receive the usual compensation of \$15 for what is nominally a ten hour day but which may be longer as the warden must remain until all votes are counted and tabulated.

The primary is being held to terminate a successor to Congressman Wilfred W. Lufkin, appointed collector of the port of Boston.

FIRE DESTROYS VESSEL. SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 15.—The schooner Lotus, owner in San Diego, burned off Point Huememe last night. The crew was saved by a rescue party from the steam schooner Humboldt, which answered the distress rockets sent up by the schooner. Point Huememe is located in Ventura county and has a lighthouse on the tip of the point.

CALIFORNIA NEWS

SAN DIEGO—With their powerful searchlights flashing over San Diego bay, fifty United States warships aided in a search for two little boys, Philip Watkins, 4 years old, and Charles Sherbno, 5, who disappeared from their homes in Coronado late today and, according to a report which reached their frantic mothers, were seen floating up the bay with the tide in a rowboat, headed toward National City.

The two little fellows were found late tonight asleep in their boat, near National City, by a boat from the destroyer Bailey. The little boat was half full of water.

SACRAMENTO—Wrapped in a crude bundle of cheesecloth and newspapers, the body of a newly-born baby girl, weighing 8 pounds, was found on the steps of the M. E. South church at Fifteenth and I streets, by P. M. Tanner, automobile salesman for the W. J. Benson company.

SAN FRANCISCO—During 40 hours, ending Tuesday, liquor worth \$250,000 was seized by federal pro-

hibition enforcement officers in northern California, according to E. Forest Mitchell, prohibition director. Forty raids were made, of which 34 were in Sacramento and the Sacramento valley, Mitchell said. Thirty-two persons were arrested. Near Sacramento a gun battle was fought with an alleged bootlegger, who escaped.

ceased members, was instrumental in organizing the present drive which will terminate on November 24. The campaign promises to be productive of results, as both teams have capable leaders and much propaganda has been circulated among local people.
