CALIFORNIA NEWS

LONG BEACH—T. A. Abbott, said by police to be a former manager of a Sacramento hotel, and T. Abbott, his brother, said to be from Portland, Ore., were arrested charged with violating the local liquor ordinance and attempting to defraud. It was charged they contracted with a city detective to sell him a barrel represented as containing whiskey for \$8.50. The barrel was found to be filled with colored water, the detective said.

SACRAMENTO—Fall rains in Washington and Oregon will soon drive the aerial forest patrol squadron back to Mather field for the winter, it was announced by officials of the field. It is possible that planes doing patrol duty in the north may return to Sacramento this week, depending on whether rains that began last week continue. The boys on duty in Washington and Oregon compose the 91st squadron.

SACRAMENTO—An effort will be made to interest certain eastern organizations in the purchase of redwood groves for memorials in Humboldt county by Deputy State Forester M. B. Pratt, who will leave for an extended trip in the east. At the last session of the legislature a bill was passed appropriating \$300,000 for the purchase of trees along the highways on the south fork of the Eel river. This sum, however, will not be sufficient to purchase the entire grove.

SACRAMENTO—Sacramento's police department may soon find the need of an airplane in order to patrol the byways of the sky properly, remarked Captain Ted Keening after he had finished reading a letter from the Allied Filers' club of Berkeley, asking co-operation of the police department in making airplanes traveling safe.

REDDING—Effort to recall three Redding city trustees, Mayor Samuel Norton, Camille Brouillard and Sherman Shadwell, failed by a large vote in favor of the incumbents. They will remain in office by majorities of 3 to 1 or better.

SAN FRANCISCO—The state alien poll tax law was declared unconstitutional by the state supreme court in a unanimous decision which held that the measure was in violation of the 14th amendment to the United States constitution and to the treaty between the United States and Japan.

OREGON BREVITIES

PORTLAND—Another death from sleeping sickness has been recorded by the city health bureau. Mrs. Jennie M. Leaman, 45, of 1170 Leibe street, was the victim. The death is the 12th from the malady reported to the health bureau this year.

PORTLAND—That \$2000 worth of household goods and furnishings have been stolen from her home by relatives she left in charge was the report to the police of Mrs. David Rundell, 260 Nartilla street. About \$500 worth of stolen goods was located in pawnshops by the police. Mrs. Rundell refused to prosecute.

ASTORIA—Three alleged slackers met their Waterloo at the session of the circuit court when admission to citizenship was denied them, their petitions being dismissed with prejudice; which means they are barred forever from becoming citizens of the country. The men were Olav Johannes Aune, a native of Norway; Johan August Suomenen and Arvid Dudolf Makela, natives of Finland.

PORTLAND—Reed college was in full swing today, with 280

students registered in all courses and others still filling out enrollment blanks. Statistics given out by the registrar show 130 new students on the official lists, the largest number on record. The freshman class, with registration incomplete, numbers 109; A faculty of 31 members is in charge.

MEDFORD—Citizens of Jacksonville are much excited over the bitter school row which has been raging in the county seat for several weeks, as a result of which the schools opened today with two superintendents and two teachers for the eighth grade. Professor Stutz, who was re-elected superintendent at \$2000, and about whom the controversy rages, was in charge Monday and Ben W. Hosmer, new superintendent elected by another faction of the board, was on hand but took no active part.

DALLAS—Demanding 75 cents a box, instead of 50 cents, several hundred hop pickers in the Wierich & Horst hopyards, near Independence, went on a strike Sunday. Sheriff Orr was called and with several deputies restored order after the ringleaders, said to be I. W. W., were forcibly escorted out of the yards and again given orders to leave the vicinity.
