His opponent, Kid Chavez, from the southern part of California has borne the reputation in the past of being a fast boy and one who felt as Pug Walters does about mixing. The boxers are scheduled to meet in a six round go following the preliminary.

The main event, ten rounds, between Bob Allen and Bob Ross as catchweights in the welterweight class, promises big results and this assertion comes after spectators have watched them both work out during the past week. Ross has a smooth easy way of putting out a jab which is lightning quick, and he is shifty on his feet. Allen is catlike in his ring movements and seems to be crafty when sparring. Judging from his shadow boxing, and from the manner in which he takes on his sparring partners, Allen will give a good account of himself in the ten rounds tonight. Ross is anxious to win over Allen in few rounds tonight as he is desirous of challenging Billy Huff of Chiloquin for a bout which is scheduled to come off a little later in the season.

Promoter Crump announces that the Scandinavian hall will be open early this evening to admit the fans. The bouts will open sharply at 8:30.

ANOTHER BIG BEAR KILLED

Klamath county this season has had the honor of being the place where two record black bears have been killed, the first one weighing 750 pounds, killed by Tim Daley and Geo. Clemmons of Medford on Gearhart mountain near Bly last Monday, and the second one, another black female bear weighting 600 pounds, killed by Jess A. Johnson on Johnson Prairie in the Jenny creek country, Friday afternoon.

Johnson, with Ed Ward, Harley Johnson and D. H. Kaylor, left their homes near the Phillips ranch on the Merrill road Wednesday to hunt deer in the Jenny creek country and had no luck until Friday afternoon when the bear was flushed on the side of a hill about 200 yards off. Mrs. Bruin, Jackson says, was making a record climb when a shot from a 7 M. M. Mauser crumpled her up, but despite the wound the bear made an effort to escape and another shot was necessary to finish her.

The hide on the animal weighed 75 pounds, ten pounds less than the Bly bear. Johnson says that this bear was rolling in fat and the meat was very tender.

The hide is being mounted as the fur was very firm and rich in luster.

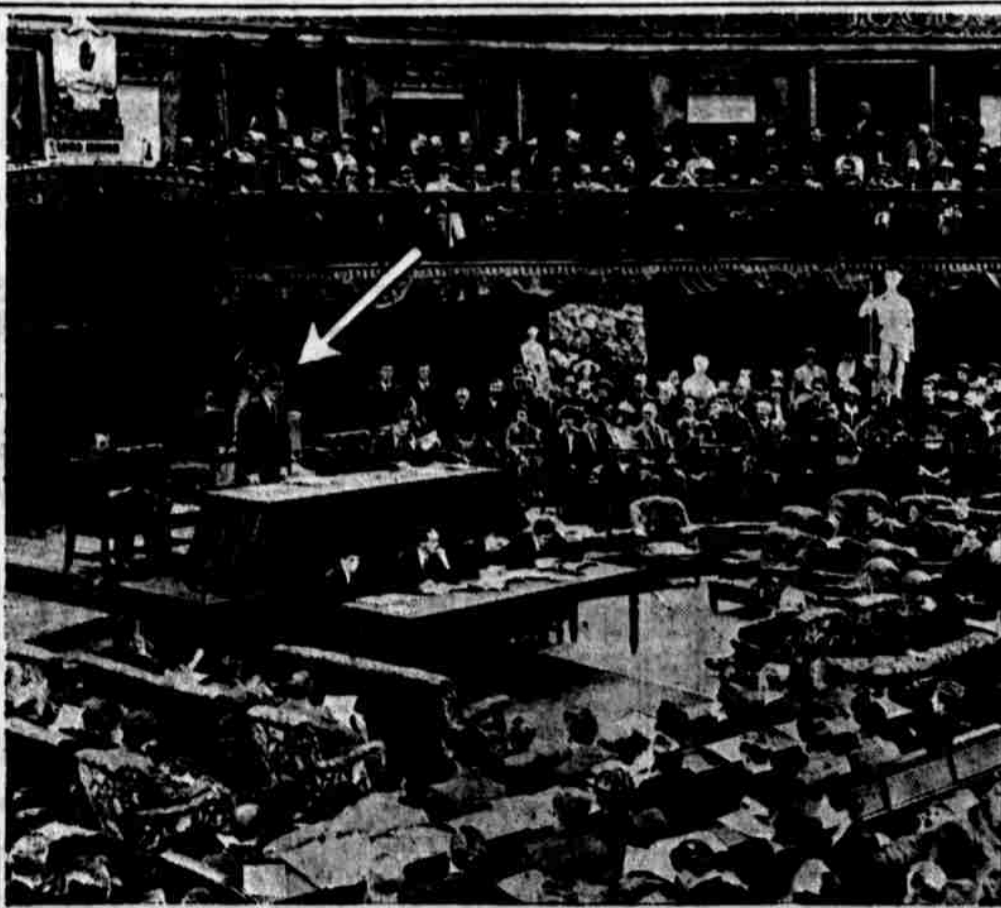
