

ELEPHANTS SET STYLE FOR HERD

Western Mills' Are Now Cutting 80 Per Cent Normal

The Weekly Lumber Review of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association says that for the week ending September 17th, ninety-nine mills in Western Oregon and Western Washington report production at 58,275,239 feet, which is twenty per cent below normal. New business totaled 62,583,158 feet. Shipments totaled 49,243,746 feet.

For delivery by rail new business included 1,334 cars; rail shipments 1,204 cars. Unshipped balance in the rail trade was 2,963 cars.

In the cargo trade, domestic orders totaled 13,187,038 feet; export 10,376,120 feet. Coastwise and inter-coastal cargo shipments totaled 8,176,626 feet; export shipments 5,047,120 feet.
