Airplanes to Take Census of Elk

VISALIA, Cal., Sept. 26.—Airplanes will be used to help determine how many elk roam the plains between the Tehachapi Pass and Kings River and Elk Hill and Bakersfield if the government authorities grant the request of J. S. Hunter, of the state fish and game commission, for the machines. Preliminary flights were made recently in a survey of the elk herds.

No accurate count has ever been made of these native California elk which have been increasing quite rapidly in recent years. The wildness of the country has precluded ground expeditions from being a success and the first air flight showed that this could succeed if time were allowed for a number of flights.

The California elk once roamed the entire state but in the early '70's had dwindled to about two pair when the slaughter was stopped by order of the Miller and Lux firm, which owned most of the San Joaquin valley. Since then the elk have increased under state protection and the fish and game commission is now anxious to ascertain their approximate number.

23 New Members on University Faculty

They dug the cellar, built the forms, poured concrete for the foundation walls and placed heavy beams in position. Now, they are doing the more advanced work on their brick building, using blue prints under the supervision of artisans.

STATE TO GIVE LECTURES ON HONEY INDUSTRY

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 26.—Lectures on bee-keeping methods are to be given at Berkeley and Los Angeles next December by government and University of California authorities under the auspices of the California State Bee-keepers' Association and the University. The lectures will be given at Berkeley from December 5 to 17 and in Los Angeles from December 5 to 10.
