## STATE C. OF C. CANCELS TOUR HOMESEEKERS

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 27.-Conditions in the Middle West, where the farmers are hard hit through crop failures, lack of markets and general hard times, has resulted in the decision of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce to cancel the homeseekers' excursion through the state as originally planned, according to announcement today.

J. R. Heuring, representative of the State Chamber, who has been advertising Oregon's opportunities in the middle western states during the past five months, reports conditions there to be unbelievably bad, due to the general business depression which has followed the good times of the past two years. The great corn producing states are the hardest hit, according to Heuring. Corn which sold for two dollars a bushel two years ago is now being contracted for at thirty cents.

Large numbers of farmers promised to come to Oregon on the September excursion, according to Heuring, but when the actual date of departure drew near only seven were able to complete their reservations.

"Although we were not able to secure a large party to come to Oregon this fall, I believe that the past summer's work in the middle west will be of enormous benefit to Oregon," declared Secretary Quayle. "Heuring personally interviewed more than 3,000 prospective settlers

## GULLS DESTROY GRASSHOPPERS

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 27.-Report from North Dakota that seagulls recently appearing in McLean County had destroyed grasshoppers which threatened to ruin the crops, called attention here to a similar incident in Mormon pioneer life in Utah.

Today a notable monument stands in the Mormon temple grounds in Salt Lake City in honor of the birds that saved the early settlers from threatened starvation in 1848. It is a pillar about 100 feet high surmounted by a bronze seagull. At its base are inscriptions detailing the reason for its erection with illustrations by Mahonri Young, the Utah sculptor.

"The first pioneers tracked across the plains into Salt Lake valley in 1847," Brigham Young stipulated that there should be intensive cultivation of the land, crops were grown and the farmers looked for a bountiful harvest the next year. Then crickets in huge armies swooped down upon the crops. The farmers tried to eliminate the pest without success. Transportation at the time
