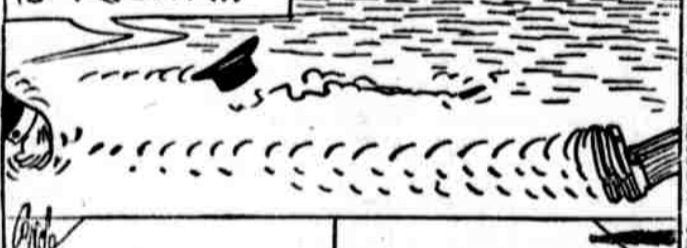

Cowboys Riding to New York as Result of a Novel Wager

BUFFALO, Wyo., Sept. 27.—Three Jackson Hole, Wyo., cowboys are on their way to New York City from Yellowstone National Park on horseback, attempting to win a wager which contains novel terms.

The terms of the wager require that they must dress in typical western costume, travel the entire distance on horseback, and reach New York not later than Jan. 1, 1922. They are required to smoke every day, but they must not buy tobacco. Horse trading is the only business which they may engage in while on the journey. No matter how serious their need may become, they will not be permitted to buy a horse while on the journey.

Montana Cow's Milk Pans Pure Gold

BILLINGS, Mont., Sept. 27.—Robert Dent, a farmer residing at Burnett, Mont., declares that a jersey cow
