Would Name Road After S. P. Officer

To name the new road between Crater Lake and Diamond Lake the "McCormick Road" in honor of Vice-President E. O. McCormick of the Southern Pacific is proposed by Representative Ben C. Sheldon of Medford. In Medford Mall Tribune Mr. Sheldon is quoted:

"The enthusiasm of Mr. E. O. McCormick of the Southern Pacific over this road is going to get tangible results. A man like Mr. McCormick, whose business makes it necessary for him to give a discriminating study to the things that will and will not attract the tourist and upon which railroads can afford to spend money in advertising, does not go far wrong in his estimate of the possibilities of supplementing the tourist attractions of Crater Lake by making available the quite different attractions at Diamond Lake. Mr. McCormick is very enthusiastic over Diamond Lake and well he may be. I guess we will have to name this new automobile trail after him."
