Ready to Start Upon Midland Market Road

The county court is taking all the necessary steps to start the active work on the Midland market road which has been under consideration this summer, but has been delayed by the lack of money to start operations. Members of the court have stated that it is their intention, if possible, to put the road through this winter.

The proposed route will lead from Klamath Falls past the slaughter house on the Keno road, then across the Southern Pacific tracks to the east side and thence follow the railroad all the way to the state line, crossing at the Oscar Sly ranch, then into Dorris. The Siskiyou county authorities are planning on completing this direct road to Weed.

Engineers have been over the route and have drawn the plans for it but the money to do the work has not been available, the county court says.

EDITORS WILL SEE VOLCANO IN ERUPTION

HILO, Island of Hawaii, T. H., Sept. 9.—By mail.—One of the world's greatest spectacles of nature—demonstrations of volcanic activity by Kilauea volcano on this island—will very possibly be unfolded before the eyes of delegates to the forthcoming world's press congress in Honolulu in October, according to L. W. deVis-Norton, secretary of the Hawaiian Volcano Research association, and an authority on the Hawaiian volcanoes.

The lava column within the vast fire pit of Kilauea has been rising steadily, according to reports from the Hawaiian volcano observatory on the rim of the great crater directly overlooking the volcano. The molten lava lakes within the great fire pit are increasing their area so rapidly that the shoals and lava rock islands which were conspicuous objects upon the lake's surface, are disappearing one by one as the molten floods overwhelm them.

The itinerary for the Press Congress delegates calls for their arrival here on the evening of October 12, and it has been arranged that the next two days will be spent by the delegates at the volcano among the wonders of America's latest national park. All indications point to a culmination of Kilauea's activities about that time, the observatory reports, and if these conditions materialize the delegates will witness a scene of marvelous and awe-inspiring brilliance, Mr. de Vis-Norton said.

Many strange things are transpiring in connection with the rapid upward swell of molten interior of the earth within the vent of Kilauea, Mr. deVis Norton said. A gigantic mass of rock is being forced steadily up from the depths and is already rearing its crest high above the white hot torrents that lap its base. The continuous movement and the vibration of this great mass is causing heavy avalanches to rush down its sides. The result is that it has sealed off until the rock mass has taken form of an extremely sharp pinnacle towering high above the lakes.

Another phenomenon in evidence is causing considerable comment. The great subsidence that occurred after the explosive eruption of last March at Kilauea caused heavy avalanches to fall from the walls of the great fire pit. These, crashing down to the depths, formed talus slopes which became covered with debris from above. During the past few days a series of remarkable spouting lava springs have broken out at intervals along the top of these debris slopes, showing that an irresistible torrent of lava is forcing its way up within them, Mr. deVis-Norton said. The various points of emergence are high above the lava lakes, and every few moments, glittering and spectacular cascades of molten fire and flame roar down over the slopes to the lakes below. It is "as though the whirlpool rapids at Niagara Falls had been turned into flame," and the spectacle is especially striking at night, Mr. deVis-Norton said.

DEER EAT YUCCAS

ONTARIO, Cal., Sept. 28.—Hungry deer feeding on the tender blossom shoots of the yucca tree, are responsible for the absence of the Spanish bayonet blossoms along the Sunset Trail in San Antonio canyon this summer, according to Chief Forest Ranger Arthur Shay.

"Although the yucca tree usually blossoms in early summer none was to be found until the end of June, and then only in small quantities in portions of the canyon where they commonly abound," Mr. Shay stated.
