Two touchdowns and one place kick Saturday afternoon won the football game for Klamath High from Ashland High the touchdowns being made by Ted Montgomery and Milam, and the place kick being booted by Ted Montgomery, while Ashland secured one touchdown at the end of the second quarter, Bowers of Ashland getting the ball on a fumble and running 25 yards thru a broken field for the coveted score.

The first half ended with the scores even, 7 to 7, but in the third quarter, within six minutes of play a well directed forward pass, Montgomery at quarter placed the ball in Milam's hands and he went over the Ashland goal for the second touchdown. Perfect defense and quick headwork enabled Ted Montgomery in this same quarter to boot the ball over the bar for 3 points additional while defensive measures by the locals prevented the visitors from getting near the home goal. The local players demonstrated the fact that their endurance powers increase after the first half has been played and with this unusual attribute, a brilliant season is predicted for the locals.
