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## American League Players Take Opening Event

### BIG CROWD ON HAND FOR FAIR OPENING TODAY

The annual Klamath County Fair opened today at the Altamont ranch, three miles south of this city, under most favorable weather conditions. A bright day greeted the visitors, and under the shade of the grove of tall poplars, the first day's program was given under the auspices of the chamber of commerce.

A tasty luncheon, cafeteria style, was served at noon to nearly 400 guests, and following it came the address by speakers from all over the state. Fred Baker presided at the forum, and neatly introduced the speakers.

The first introduction on the program was the fair queen, Miss Dorothy Short, and her two maids of honor, Misses Della Short and Zelma Tripett. The young ladies greeted their subjects with winsome smiles and accorded the subjects the full rights to have three days of fun and entertainment, as well as instruction.

The chairman introduced Mr. Lawson, a representative of the Northwest Shorthorn Breeders' association, whose home is in Spokane, Washington. Mr. Lawson, before going into the theme of the county fair, read a telegram from the Pacific International Livestock show at Portland, inviting the participants of the local fair to take part in the exposition soon to take place. He next dwelt upon the optimism which prevailed among the Shorthorn breeders and the stockmen in general. Conditions were adjusting themselves so as to make times better for the raisers of all kinds of livestock, he said. One of the ways to help the industry was by the means of county fairs, where stock would be shown, and the better breeding resulting from competition would assist the farmer and others from a financial standpoint.

Both growers of dairy and beef cattle, he said, were the backbone of a community, and the greater number of each variety, the greater the financial returns. The fair at Union county eight years ago was smaller than this fair today, he said, but today it ranks second to none in the state. Lawson claimed that Union county had the largest county exhibit in any western state, and had developed the taxable possibilities wonderfully.

The most distinctive compliment was paid to Klamath county when he said: "I have covered many fairs in my business, but never have I found a better display of pure bred dairy and beef stock than I have judged today."
