E. H. Thomas, county agent, next, and briefly, discussed the development of dairy and beef stock, pointing out that the dairy stock here is the finest in the state. He deplored the scarcity of dairy animals on display compared to the fine showing of beef cattle. He also advocated the construction of a fair grounds.

Guy G. Emery of Portland spoke at length on the "Test of a Community," and plead for the admission of women into every civic and state movement. Develop the younger class for the future battles and create an optimistic, co-operative spirit in them, so later on in life they can handle the problems of life, he urged.

The most dramatic part of his speech was that Klamath county had no place in its confines for a "knocker." As the world was large, train service was still good to other parts of the world. The test of a community lay in its education and upbringing of the boys and girls into responsible, thinking citizens.

The beef cattle displays by F. L. Pope, J. E. Eaman, W. F. Hammond, L. A. West, W. Patterson, William Cheyne, Charles Mack, Frank McCormack, William Tingley and H. C. Tipton were the finest displays of pure bred stock possible, all the cattle being groomed and fed up to the best degree possible, and the sides of the pen were crowded by spectators. The dairy herds attracted attention, too, but the showing was small, mostly local dairymen's herds.

The sheep displays by Fred McKeandree, consisting of Cotswold bucks; Shropshires by Burr Westbrook; Corriedales by E. M. Thombrook; Corriedales by E. H. Thombouillettes by W. E. Hammond, J. Cortes, S. Dixon and Rex E. Bord, drew much attention. An interested group were about the Cotswold pens at all times. The lamb display by the Davis brothers was well patronized.

Hogs of all sizes, breeds and pedigrees were shown as were implements and excellent displays of fine needlecraft. The boys and girls section, under direction of Frank Sexton, drew much favorable comment. The fruit sections were well filled and the canning products many. Rabbits and poultry were displayed in a section by themselves.

From the tiny chick to the goose and turkey, poultry of all sorts crowded and strutted before spectators.

This afternoon stock judging took place on the cattle. The program tomorrow will be in charge of the Farm Bureau with judging in the forenoon, basket luncheon at noon and an address by George M. Mansfield, president of the State Farm Bureau. The afternoon will be given over to sports.
