Flowers and Fancy Work Fill Room at Fair Grounds

Apples, strawberries, raspberries, more apples, plums, prunes, a whole room full of every type of flower grown here this time of the year, another room filled with thread-lace, trimmed pillow slips that cause one to marvel that human hands could fashion things so dainty, table linen and bed covers that attract attention, a pair of Flemish giant rabbits that were grown by little Bobbie Davis, who made \$41.52 from the sale of their offspring since June, these and many more things are on exhibit at the county fair.

Hanging modestly away in a back room of the old farm house being used at the Altamont ranch for exhibition space, were several interesting family heirlooms. Mrs. R. A. Emmitt's name was attached to a white muslin skirt embroidered in 1851 by her mother. The hundreds of small eyelets which make up the pattern form a wide panel down the front and a border clear around the whole. The four yards at the bottom make this old hoop skirt seem a sort of dream to beholders.

Just as wonderful, seemingly, is the quilt 86 years old; the bed cover of Mrs. Martha Hawkins which boasts 81 years, and the cover belonging to Mrs. Amanda Hamaker an even 100 years old, not to mention the linen dresser scarf that Mrs. Hamaker's mother grew and bleached the flax for and then wove with her own hands. There is another bed spread on exhibit which is older even than the two belonging to Mrs. Hamaker and Mrs. Hawkins.

Another room in the house is given over to the exhibition of girls' club work sewing. This display is made up of dresses, aprons and other plain sewed articles.

Canal Bridges Are Now Open to Travel

Street Commissioner Robert Hunsaker reports that the two bridges across the canal recently under course of repairs are now in the best of condition and cites the bridge over the Esplanade as a fine piece of work, one which he feels sure will last for a long time.

Crude oil will be poured over the flooring and as there are no cracks for it to flow into the canal below, Commissioner Hunsaker expects that this coating will sink deeply into the wood and offer resistance to wear, also will prevent rot from setting in.
