Deeds show the "Quinta" was built in 1761. In 1814 it was confiscated by a Spanish general who had sacked the outpost and was used as a prison for more than 600 American women and girls who were forced to grind corn and perform other labor.

It next entered the limelight of Texas history when it was selected as the first postoffice for San Antonio, about 1849. Then it was the property of John Bowen, the first postmaster. It remained in the family since. For the past few years it was the home of several Mexican families and one or two small business enterprises. The slots cut in the massive doors in which to drop letters remained until the last.
