NEWS FROM THE STATE CAPITAL

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 7.—Special—Advance preparation is to be made by the people of Scappoose, Columbia county, to please tourists who visit Oregon for the world's fair in 1925. They propose to plant trees and flowers along the Lower Columbia River highway near that place and have written the state highway department to ascertain if authority will be granted. The commission will take up the question at its next meeting.

An quarantine against alfalfa weevil in Malheur county may be declared by the state board of horticulture and proclaimed by the governor, according to Charles A. Park, president of the board, who has returned to Salem after investigating conditions there, a restriction of shipments of alfalfa out of the county will be necessary.

Governor Olcott takes a rap at the Ku Klux Klan in a communication sent Herbert Bayard Swope, executive editor of the New York World, who telegraphed the governor for his opinion. The Oregon governor declares his opposition to organizations such as the Klan.

Under a law passed several years

ago in Oregon, money received by the state treasurer on account of inheritance taxes is paid into the general fund, according to an opinion of Attorney General Van Winkle in reply to inquiries by State Treasurer Koser. In case of an excess payment of inheritance tax money into the treasury, the refund may be made from the general fund.

A report to J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of schools, by Mrs. Lena Shurtle, county superintendent for Morrow county, shows that 683 boys and 638 girls were enrolled in the schools of that county during the last school year. Of these, 115 boys and 142 girls were in high school. Eighty-seven teachers were employed, only 11 of whom were men. The average monthly salary of men teachers was \$179 and women \$123.

Official figures show a total attendance at the Oregon State fair, which closed Saturday, of 132,390, against \$0,113, the total for last year, which broke a record up to that time. Receipts of the 1921 fair were \$106,754.30, against \$90,000 last year. Net profits this year are between \$25,000 and \$30,000.

the condition of the world's sugar bowl has upon the life of the Hawaiian Islands was exemplified here recently when the United States customs officials announced that there had been a decrease of \$14,553,124 in the territory's exports to the mainland United States during the fiscal year ending June 30, last, as compared with the exports of the previous fiscal year.

Only the fact that the value of exported pineapples increased by nearly \$11,000,000 kept the figures from falling much lower, as they reflected the fall in price of raw sugar from its peak price of 23.56 cents per pound in 1920 to its present price of less than 5 cents a pound. The decline in the value of exported raw sugar during 1921 was \$25,372,526 under 1920, the respective figures being \$91,048,269 and \$116,420,795.

Idaho Wins Anti-Tuberculosis Cup

BOISE, Idaho, Oct. 7.—Idaho has won the huge silver cup offered by the National Anti-Tuberculosis association to the state which excels in health crusade work among school children, according to information received by Mrs. J. O. Athey, executive secretary for Idaho.

The cup was captured by the state of Iowa last year. It was first offered at the National Educational association meeting in Salt Lake City in 1920. A state has to win the cup three times in order to gain permanent possession.

Eleven rules of hygienic living taught to the children of the state by the association include brushing the teeth regularly, bathing a certain number of times a week, sleeping with the window open, deep breathing, using neither tea nor coffee, etc. Every child who complies with 75 per cent of the "chores" weekly is to be enrolled as a "knight bannerette."

Proposes Government Rain-Making Trials

BROADUS, Mont., Oct. 7.—A proposal that the United States government enter the business of "rain making" in an experimental way has been submitted to Congressman Carl W. Riddick of this state by Hugo Camplin, president of the Broadus chamber of commerce.

Mr. Camplin expresses the belief that by means of aerial bombardment the heavy clouds which often gather without dropping their moisture on parched soil can be made to release it, and that scattered clouds could be forced together by the same means to form a heavy rain-cloud.

Heavy rainfall during periods of bombardments in the world war, and its cessation when the big guns were silenced, are cited by Mr. Camplin as evidence that the same agencies could be called upon to force precipitation in times of peace.
