

POWER CO. BUYS SITE, MEDFORD

Announcement has been made by H. L. Walther, district manager of the California-Oregon Power company, that an option has been signed by the power company for the tract of land at the foot of Grape street, adjoining the Southern Pacific tracks, and that a warehouse, 200 by 50 feet, will be constructed for the storage of electrical supplies and equipment for the territory served by the company. The cost and design of the warehouse have not been determined.

Work on the re-modeling of the company building on Main street, for the installation of the head offices of the concern will be started as soon as the architect can draw the plans, and the contractors' bids can be let. The second and third floor will be remodeled, and the home offices of the company established here, being moved from San Francisco, Cal., where they have been since the formation of the light company. Byron H. Hurd, assistant to the general manager, has arrived to attend to details.

The new home offices will be opened in this city January 1st, next and the officers and families, and equipment, records, etc., will arrive a month earlier.

Water Flow Impedes Mills Sewer Work

Lorenz brothers, engaged in the laying of sewer in Mills addition, say that they are encountering great difficulty with their operations because of the flow of water which comes into the ditches from the Sixth street sewers, from the flushing of the Main street sewers by the street gang, and from the pumping out of the water from the Winter's building.

The matter was called to Mayor Wiley's attention yesterday and relief was assured the contractors.

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OREGON BREVITIES

HOOD RIVER—Sheriff Johnson, Marshall Hart, Deputy Sloat, County Judge H. L. Hasbrouck, District Attorney Baker, Councilman Cameron and Deputy Woods carried out a raid on an I. W. W. camp, which had been established in the woods along the Columbia river, near the city, and from which leaders were disseminating propaganda with the object of causing dissension among the workers in the orchards.

PENDLETON—That coyotes are doing more damage to sheep this fall than they have done for many years is a statement made by Doc Holmes, well known sheepman of Gibbon, who was here. Bears are also killing many sheep and the depredations of the wild animals are becoming so serious that a concerted effort to stop them will be made by livestock men.

HOOD RIVER—During a spell of dementia M. M. Graer, ex-service man with a fighting record, committed suicide in jail here by running head downward at a wall, suffering a terrible fracture of his skull and dying within a few hours. During the war he suffered shell shock.

GRANTS PASS—Too much beef proved disastrous to the Grants Pass football eleven Saturday afternoon when they were defeated by the husky Ashland aggregation by a score of 61-0 score. The visitors pounded through the light local line almost at will, the players showing splendid training. Klamath high will play Ashland in the near future.

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CALIFORNIA NEWS

OROVILLE—Reports of the discovery of a grove of redwood trees in the mountains of Eastern Butte County is confirmed by Lloyd P. Cornell, an engineer who traversed that region. The trees are of the Sequoia sempervirens species, but are smaller than the coast trees of the same family.

UNIVERSITY FARM, DAVIS—Potato growers of California, in annual conference this week, were told by Professor E. B. Babcock, head of the Genetics Department, that the University has done little or nothing in the past few years for the development of potatoes, because it has no land suitable for such work at Berkeley.

CHICO—The Pentecostal healing movement as typified in the work of Mrs. Simple McPherson at San Jose recently, was condemned as unspiritual and divisive of the church, in a resolution adopted at the meeting here of the Sacramento River Baptist Association, which closed its annual session here last night with an address by Rev. Bryant Wilson of Sacramento.

SACRAMENTO—County Superintendent of Schools Miss Carolyn Webb is perfecting a plan whereby each of the Sacramento County schools will be provided with sweet pea seed for planting to enable each school to compete for a cup in the spring.

SAN FRANCISCO—Frank Johnson's reputed "soft drink establishment, located thirty seven feet from the main entrance of the Federal Building on Seventh street, was raided by prohibition officers. Johnson was placed under arrest charged with violation of the Prohibition Law and a quantity of liquor was seized.
