STATE FIGURES ON EDUCATION AMAZE TEACHERS

Professor Butler yesterday in a speech at the forum of the chamber of commerce announced statistics on the Oregon school system which surprised many hearers.

Professor Butler stated that the compilers of the statistics had ranked the different counties in Oregon in the order of efficiency of their school system, using the same measurements that were used by the department of education of the Russell Sage foundation when it ranked the different states in the union according to their efficiency.

Ten items of school efficiency were quoted by Professor Butler and the standing of Klamath county given according to its rank in the state of Oregon.

In average days attended by each child of school age, Klamath stood 21st with Multnomah, Grant and Union counties leading.

Average annual expenditure per child of school age, Klamath 20th, Sherman, Lake, Morrow first. Average annual expenditure per child of school age, Klamath 19th, Sherman, Lake and Morrow first.

In educational features, all statistics combined, Klamath stood in the yearly rank with the rest of the Oregon counties as follows: 1915, 12th; 1916, 9th; 1917, 19th; 1918, 28th; 1919, 33th; 1920, 25th, 1921, 7.

Oregon people however have much satisfaction in the comparison of this state with the rest of the union when its youth, as a state is compared to the older states.
