

# LUMBER ACTIVE, BEST MARKET FOR TWO YEARS

Dealers buying to fill short retail stocks, and wholesalers speculating on poorly balanced mill stocks, last week gave Pacific Northwest manufacturers their second active selling week in nearly two years, says the Weekly Lumber Review of the West Coast Lumbermen's association.

One hundred and two mills reporting sold \$2,550,798 feet of lumber. Forty-one per cent was sold to move by water.

New business was 26% above production and 20% above shipments. Production was 16% below normal.

Conceding that current buying has apparently not yet reached its peak, well-informed lumbermen nevertheless say the sudden demand is likely to fade as quickly as it developed.

Fundamental to stability in the lumber industry is normal purchasing in industrial and railroad requirements. These two factors are conspicuously missing in the present situation—the railroads confining their purchasing to urgent repairs and replacements; and wood-using industries practically not buying, although the prospects are good.

Unemployment in the Pacific Northwest lumber industry continues around 38%. Prohibitive freight rates are primarily the reason for this unemployment inasmuch as producing regions located more closely to eastern and mid-west markets are under-selling west coast woods to just about the extent of the freight differential against west coast woods.

During recent months the Pacific Northwest industry as a whole has been losing \$2.50 a thousand on its lumber production. Naturally under this condition mills of this region cannot longer take the freight rate differential against them, out of the f. o. b. mill price.

Production was reported at 65,778,961 feet. Shipments 66,022,219 feet. Business for rail delivery 1618 cars; and rail business shipped during the week totaled 1514 cars. The unshipped balance for the rail trade at 102 mills was 3,639 cars. Coastwise and intercoastal cargo shipments totaled 12,007,525 feet, and in export 8,634,594 feet.

# NEGRO Y. M. C. A. WORK GROWING

CHICAGO, Oct. 17.—Fourteen colored Y. M. C. As. have been built in as many cities during the past eight years and efforts are being made to erect several more. L. Wilbur Messer, general secretary of the Chicago Y. M. C. A., reports. Total cost has been \$1,980,000.

These buildings were put up with the help of Julius Rosenwald of this city. Under a standing offer of \$25,000 toward each new one he has contributed a total of \$50,000, and his offer has still a year and a half to run.

Paid-up membership in the negro associations numbers 22,000 and they reach many more, Mr. Messer said. That in Chicago, the first and largest, had about 2500 men and boys members last year. It was at Mr. Rosenwald's suggestion and with his help that the plan was tried here and his gifts to other cities continues to be made through the Chicago Y. M. C. A.

George A. Arthur, a slightly built colored man, is in charge of the Chicago colored department. Colored management is the rule through all 14 of these departments. Mr. Arthur had made a success in business before he resolved to pioneer in this field, and Mr. Messer reports he has conducted his department with success and credit and that there is "no more loyal Y. M. C. A. in Chicago."

The budget of Mr. Arthur's department this year is \$39,000 and the colored people pay about 87 per cent of it.

Adjustment of the rural negro of the South to the industrial north is a more difficult problem than that

of the immigrant, according to Mr. Arthur. He adds that the colored Y. M. C. A.'s have been the chief factor in their communities in promoting this readjustment, because they were the only institutions that had the necessary equipment, methods on leadership already at hand.

Bad gangs of young colored boys have been broken up by the local Y. M. C. A., Mr. Arthur reports, by getting their members interested in swimming and other sports. It works largely on industrial lines, having eleven baseball teams organized this year in nearby packing houses and industrial plants. It also has formed efficiency clubs of colored men within the plants.

Other colored Y. M. C. A.'s are located in New York, Brooklyn, Pittsburgh, Philadelphia, Columbus, St. Louis, Indianapolis, Nashville, Cincinnati, Kansas City, Baltimore, Washington and Atlanta.
