Moonshiners' Cave In Cliff Raided

HELENA, Mont., Oct. 17.—Constables J. M. Adamson and Charles Hegeman recently seized a still whose site was accessible only by small boats across a rapid river and was only visible from high overhanging cliffs.

The river runs swiftly and is not navigable only by small boats and then only with expert boatmen in charge. The still was concealed from chance passersby in boats and there is no road through the canyon.

Working on a clue, the officers went to the top of the cliffs overlooking a small island in the middle of the Mississippi River in Spokane Canyon, about 15 miles from here in the heart of a wild country. From their vantage point the officers saw the vent pipe of a still. The seizure soon followed.

Will Revive Road Used by Pioneers

LIVINGSTON, Mont., Oct. 17.—A long forgotten road of the early days of Montana is being sought by the residents of Park County to solve a pressing transportation problem.

The present road from Livingston to the mining camp at Cooke City follows a difficult route, which includes a detour through a portion of Yellowstone National Park.
