EX-RULER OF BAVARIA DEAD

LONDON, Oct. 19.—Ludwig III, former king of Bavaria, died yesterday at Savar castle, Germany, where he had been living in retirement since his dethronement at the close of the war.

Ludwig III, as king of Bavaria, was ruler of a kingdom which next to Prussia is the largest state in the German empire both in area and population. When, in his 68th year, he ascended the throne on November 5, 1913, he was the first full-fledged king that this big south German kingdom had known since 1886, for in the interim of twenty-seven years the Bavarians had recognized as their nominal rulers two insane sovereigns, the extravagant palace-builder, Ludwig II, who drowned himself, and his brother, King Otto, known as "Mad" Otto, who was deposed because of his mental infirmities.

Ludwig (the German for Louis) was born January 7, 1845, and was brought up from his infancy as heir-apparent to the throne of Greece, occupied for more than thirty years by his father's brother, brother, King Otto, known as Prince of Greece until his father was deposed and fled from Athens on board an English man-of-war in 1862. During this period the young Bavarian prince had become a master of everything Greek, modern and ancient, having been tutored with the idea that he would some day assume the Hellenic throne.

In 1863 he married the Archduchess Maria Theresa of Austria-Este, who was Princess Royal of Hungary and Bohemia, by whom he later had nine children. She was an ambitious and able woman who is said to have done much to bring about the political conditions favorable to his enthronement.
