

Mills Sewer System Work Being Rushed By Contractors

Work on the Mills addition sewers are being rapidly pushed by the Lorenz Brothers who have the contract for installing the mains and pipes. The work has been progressing at the rate of 600 feet a day, say the contractors, and as six and one half miles of the system must be laid to take care of the addition, the contractors are bending every effort to accomplish the work before the weather becomes too stormy.

The work for a portion of the time was done under difficulties as seepage hampered the workmen in their operations but the flow of water was stopped after the men had laid the portion near the canal. The digging machine has now crossed Sixth street and is on its way towards the lake. The land being crossed belongs to the Ewauna Box company. An easement was offered the city several weeks ago by the company but the council took no action upon the matter.

Manholes are now being constructed along the sewerage system and the septic tank is being constructed. As soon as possible the pumps will be placed in position, the contractors say. Since the sewers have been under way, applications have been made by others residents of Mills addition for service. Most of the applicants live beyond the present zone being constructed, but extensions can be laid very easily from the initial point of construction to serve them, Lorenz brothers say. The council last week listened to the plea of a number of people who are off the present sewer and are investigating the probable cost of giving them service.

The contractors say that they will accomplish as much of the system as possible this fall and should the weather become too inclement, the balance of the work will be completed this coming spring.
