NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—Mrs. Domenico Zaccacchia—whose successful efforts to keep a family of 18 on the \$20 a week earned by her husband received public notice after President Harding recently wrote congratulating her on her large family—has repulsed a caller who was prepared, by up-to-the minute charts, to show the matron how to live scientifically.

"She was a young woman with big, horn-rimmed spectacles and several books and papers under her arm," said Mrs. Zaccacchia. "She wanted to come in, look over the place, interview the children one by one and then draw up a chart showing us how to live scientifically."

"I asked her if she was married. She said she wasn't."

"I asked her if she ever tried keeping a large family on \$20 a week. She said she hadn't."

"Then I told her to go out and try both and when she had got away with them she might come back and we'd compare notes. That was the last we saw of her."

"We have always gotten along and the chances are we always will. All we ask is to be let alone and given a fifty-fifty chance. We don't want anything that isn't ours."

It's a cheerful flat on East 19th street, which Mrs. Zaccacchia keeps for her husband and 16 children. Over the mantelpiece hangs the President's letter which made the family famous.

Mrs. Zaccacchia is hopeful that her husband soon may get a raise which it was intimated might come when the husband's English improved.

"Maybe soon," said Mrs. Zaccacchia. "He knows more English every day."

Threshing Season Draws to Close

The fall harvest is practically finished. F. E. Pellett stated today, and the major portion of the grain in Klamath county all threshed. Pellett said that the season this year lasted 55 days.

Among the big jobs undertaken by A. A. Switzer, owner of one of the threshing rigs, was for James Dixon, who threshed nearly 6,000 bushels of wheat and oats on his place.

A farmer named Bushong living near Keno, secured 76 bushels of oats per acre from seed obtained from Corvallis. To get this yield, Bushong kept his two boys in the grain patch constantly scaring off the blackbirds who bothered the growing grain, Pellett said.


The owner of the rig threshed nearly 6,000 bushels of grain on his place on the Merrill road three miles south of this city. Quality was fine for both wheat and oats. Threshing prices per bushel ran from 6 to 10 cents.
