### See Street Cars and Movies First Time on Honeymoon

HONOLULU, T. H., Sept. 15.—(By Mail)—From their home on the small island of Nihaui, of the Hawaiian group, 250 miles west of Oahu, Ulluli Kawabala and his bride, came to Honolulu on their honeymoon and had their first taste of twentieth-century life, saw their first automobile and street car, gasped with amazement at the movies, marveled at the electric lights, and never ceased wondering at the metropolitan buildings of Honolulu.

They explained that they had never before been off their native island of Nihaui, one of the less important and less known of the archipelago. They said that primitive conditions ruled mainly on this island, that the inhabitants still lived for the most part in thatched huts, obtained their simple existence in the primitive fashion of their ancestors by catching a few fish and raising some crops, principally taro from the roots of which "poi" the ancient food of Hawaii is made.

Nihaui is the last remaining stronghold of the ancient Hawaiian customs and mode of life. The influence of the Caucasian has permeated all other districts of the territory. The island is owned by the Gay and Robinson estate and no person except a resident of the island may visit the place without permission of the estate. The island is used as a sheep grazing preserve. There also is a large peacock plan-
