BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT POSSIBILITY

The University Club, in line with its announced policy to promote the welfare of the athletic and social life of this community has started one of its programs for the winter entertainment by sending out letters to the Klamath Agency, Merrill, Dorris, the American Legion, and Klamath county high school, asking that representatives be sent to a conference dealing with the formation of a basketball circuit.

According to information, there is a possibility of a six team club, the adoption of a regular schedule of games, and promotion of athletics during the coming winter, not only in this city but at the Agency, Dorris and Merrill. In the past years, it is said that Merrill had a formidable town team which made a very creditable record, and the possibilities for the formation of a basketball team there this winter are bright. The Agency can make up a splendid team of Indians, or can send a mixed team, whichever is decided on. Records show that Indian teams all over the United States have more than outshone their Caucasian teammates in action. Dorris at one time had a splendid organization and gave a good account of itself in play with town teams in northern California. Among the members of the American Legion, some national talent can be secured who would bring not only the name of the American Legion to the fore but would reflect credit upon Klamath county and this city. The Klamath County High school has material which could be whipped into shape quickly and easily and some of the players would be equal physically to the members of the adult teams. Youth can ring circles about the adult player in basketball owing to agility. The only factors in the association would be the strength of the University club, recently formed and their entry into the circuit would be a matter of speculation as to the team and its chances for a successful season. Many players would be found who formerly were varsity men and also bearers of letters for a season on some "U" or college team.

The only "fly in the ointment" is the finding of a suitable place where the basketball schedule could be carried out in this city and the

University club members are now looking all over the city for a proper place. McDonald's Hall was inspected today.

Parole Granted to Holbrook, Paddock

The state parole board has granted a parole to William Holbrook and J. E. Paddock, convicted of manslaughter in connection with the killing of O. T. McKendree in a range dispute at Dry Prairie, Klamath county, in April, 1918, according to word received here.

As far as can be learned the board acted of its own initiative. Holbrook and Paddock had served but a few months of their sentence.

CHARTER AMENDMENTS SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS BY THE COUNCIL An Act

To amend the charter of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, entitled "A Bill proposed by Initiative petition for an act to enact, provide and adopt a charter for the City of Klamath Falls, Klamath County, Oregon, to be submitted to the legal voters of the City of Klamath Falls, Klamath County, Oregon, for their approval or rejection at a special election to be held in said City on the 10th day of March, 1913," submitted to and approved by the legal voters of said City on the 10th day of March, 1913, as subsequently amended by the legal voters of said City at the special election held therein on the 14th day of November, 1916, and as subsequently amended by the legal voters of said City at the special election held therein on the 13th day of August, 1921, and to amend all other amendments thereto.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS that the charter of the City of Klamath Falls, same being an act entitled "A Bill proposed by Initiative petition for an act to enact, provide and adopt a charter for the City of Klamath Falls, Klamath County, Oregon, to be submitted to the legal voters of the City of Klamath Falls, Klamath County, Oregon, for their approval or rejection at a special election to be held in said City on the 10th day of March, 1913," submitted to and approved by the legal voters of said City on the 10th day of March, 1913, as subsequently amended by the legal voters of said City at the special election held therein on the 14th day of November, 1916, as subsequently amended by the legal voters of said City at the special election held therein on the 12th day of August, 1921, and all other amendments thereto, be and the same hereby is amended by adding thereto Section 310 to read as follows:

SECTION 310. (a) For the purpose of providing additional funds with which to pay and redeem the \$20,500 City of Klamath Falls Improvement Bonds, dated May 1, 1911, numbered _____ to _____ which matured May 1, 1921, together with the accrued interest thereon, and also to pay and redeem the City of Klamath Falls Improvement Bonds dated April 1, 1912 maturing April 1, 1922, numbered _____ to _____ aggregating \$12,501.56 together with accrued interest thereon, the Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, is hereby authorized and empowered to issue and dispose of general obligation refunding bonds of said city in the sum of \$65,000.00 in denominations of \$1,000 or \$500 each, duly signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the Police Judge under the corporate seal of the City, having semi-annual interest coupons thereto attached bearing the engraved fac-simile signatures of the Mayor and Police Judge, whereby the City shall be held in substance and effect to undertake to pay the bearer of each of said bonds at maturity thereof of the sum therein named in gold coin of the United States of the present standard of value with interest thereon in like gold coin at the rate of six per cent (6%) per annum, payable semi-annually, said bonds to be known as City of Klamath Falls Refunding Bonds, said bonds to be dated November 1, 1921, and to mature in not to exceed twenty years from date of issue, principal and interest to be payable at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Oregon in New York City.

(b) The debt limitations contained in the charter of said City shall not apply to the bonds hereby authorized.

(c) Said bonds shall be sold by the Council as in its judgment may be best, and the surplus, if any, over the amount necessary to redeem the aforesaid improvement bonds, derived from the sale thereof, shall be paid into the general fund of the City.

(d) The purchaser or purchasers of said bonds shall in no wise be required to see to the application of the purchase money therefor.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the ballot title for said proposed charter amendments shall be in words and figures substantially as follows:

CHARTER AMENDMENTS SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS BY THE COUNCIL

An Act.
To amend the charter of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, same being an act submitted to and approved by the voters of said City at a special election held therein on March 10, 1913, as subsequently amended at special elections held therein on November 14, 1916 and August 12, 1921, and to amend all other amendments by adding Section

310 providing for an issue of Refunding Bonds in the sum of \$65,000 to provide additional funds to redeem approximately \$67,000 improvement bonds matured and unpaid, and approximately \$12,500 maturing April 1, 1922, and accrued interest thereon.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Police Judge be and he is hereby instructed to publish the hereinabove proposed charter amendments submitted to the voters by the Council in the manner provided by law; that is to say, by publication of this resolution for two consecutive publications within the fifteen days immediately preceding said special election in Evening Herald, same being a newspaper published in the City of Klamath Falls and hereby designated for said purpose.
