

SPROULE SAYS STRIKE DEFIES U. S. GOVERNMENT

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 24.—The proposed strike of railroad employes is against the order of the United States Railroad Labor board, rendered June 1, 1921, after full hearing of both sides, declaring that there should be a 12 1/2 per cent reduction of wages," said Wm. Sproule, president of the Southern Pacific company, in a statement explaining the causes for the strike.

Mr. Sproule's statement, directed to heads of departments of the Southern Pacific company, follows: "To dispel misconception and misunderstanding it is all important that the public and the employes should know at the outset and bear in mind continually just what it is that this proposed strike of the railroad employes is directed against. They are not striking because of any refusal of the railroads to reduce rates. They are not striking because of any intention expressed by the railroad to avail themselves of the right conferred by the Transportation Act, 1920, to appeal to the Railroad Labor board for a further reduction in wages. The strike vote was taken some time before the meeting of the Railroad Executives at Chicago and before their attitude in respect to rates or further reduction of wages was known. The strike is against the order of the Railroad Labor board rendered June 1, 1921, after full hearing of both sides, declaring that there should be a 12 1/2 per cent reduction of wages. There can be no question as to the correctness of this statement. The morning papers of Oct. 17 printed a telegram from Cleveland which states what the correspondents obtained from the Brotherhood's representative as to the strike in the following language: "The strike is against the 12 1/2 per cent wage cut ordered by the Railroad Labor board. It cannot take into consideration the new wage cut, which the railroad executives made known their intention of asking, because that cut has not gone before the Labor board and therefore cannot be officially known to the Brotherhoods."

"The New York Times of Oct. 19 quotes from communication of the Brotherhood leaders to their local chairman as follows: "Sirs and Brothers: The vote of the members..... was overwhelmingly in favor of a strike on the question of wage reductions—by the United States Railroad Labor board, effective July 1st, 1921." "It follows from the above that the strike is directed against the provisions of the Act of Congress; it is a protest against the conclusion of the Railroad Labor Board; and it is not due to any action of the railroad executives, for certainly no one can impose responsibility upon the railroad executives for making an application for reduction of wages which was sustained by the Railroad Labor board."
