

CIRCUIT COURT

A number of orders were signed this week by Judge Kuykendall bearing upon cases which have been pending for some time.

A referee was ordered in the case of B. F. Hogue against Etta E. Hogue.

Temporary custody of Edward Ekwall, an adopted son, was given to Axel E. Ekwall, against the foster mother, Jessie, pending a divorce suit now on file.

Default judgment was entered in the suits filed by the State Industrial Accident commission against W. M. Brown and Tom Moore for the sum of \$58.89 and also against C. T. Darley for the sum of \$299.33, the amount of money due the industrial commission under the workmen's compensation act.

W. A. West was given a judgment against Claude and Tracy Staar for the sum of \$296.75 with interest at 6 per cent from August 1, 1921, and execution ordered against the property of Claude Staar to settle the account.

Publication of summons in the following cases of non residents of the state were ordered: Charlotte Agee against Oscar Agee, divorce; Robert B. Allison against Cora Allison, divorce; John Shannon against John and Emma Hamilton for plumbing work and materials amounting to \$533.81 for building in Nichols addition furnished January 7, 1921.

Suits ordered dismissed were those of K. Sugarman against Kirk Cash store dismissed at plaintiff's cost; Ewauna Box company against Southern Pacific railway, with costs to neither party; two suits filed by the First National bank against Walter C. Fahrig, now settled by plaintiff, and the other against W. C. Fahrig and Jack D. O'Connor, also being non suited by the plaintiff.

Wyma Jungwirth has filed suit for divorce from P. B. Jungwirth in the circuit court alleging cruelty, also asking custody of their five year old son.
