

GREAT SHOWING FOR BOYS' AND GIRLS' CLUBS

Frank Sexton, county club agent, is preparing the annual report of the Boy's and Girl's Club of Klamath county for the information of State Club Leader, H. C. Seymour at Corvallis.

The report covers the activities of the 15 clubs organized in the county under the direction of the County Club Agent Sexton during the year 1921. Thirteen districts are reported as being 100 per cent perfect in their yearly work with Bonanza showing a membership 24 strong and 100 per cent perfect. Every member completed the course of instruction, the report shows.

Total membership in all clubs is given at 255 enrolled students.

In the potato project, two districts, Miller Hill with a club of 11 members, Lone Pine with 12 members, 30 members of the 23 completed the prescribed work for the year and produced jointly 2,832 bushels of marketable potatoes having a market value of \$3,400. Special instruction was given the members in recognizing diseases, cultivation, seed selection and irrigation. The oldest member of the club was 17, the youngest 12.

The pig club project consisted of four boys and one girl representing Lone Pine, Pine Grove, Summer and Spring Lake districts. Five pigs were purchased at weaning time, all being registered stock. The total pounds produced of pork was 1,021, a daily gain of 1.14 pounds.

The total cost, including purchase, labor and feed amounted to \$141.90; sale price \$165; net profit above expenses, \$23.10. All pigs were shown at the county fair this fall.

The Duroc Jersey sow reared by Bryant Williams took first prize at the fair and its record showed that it gained 225 pounds in four months feeding. A balanced ration under direction of the Oregon Agricultural College was given the animal consisting of alfalfa, mill feed and some skim milk. Pig cost \$10, present market value \$50.

The canning club project consisted of six girls in the Henley and Summers district, all completing the work outlined for the club. Combined canning consisted of 192 quarts of fruit and 162 quarts of vegetables. Total cost of work and products was \$52.37, net profit above cost, \$155.30.

The poultry project had a total enrollment of 17 members, 14 completing the course. The course included eggs produced in six months and chicks hatched and raised by hens, also record of chicks reared from outside purchases. The project shows a net gain of \$356.97. The egg record from 95 hens was 902 dozen, an average monthly rate of 1.4 dozen per hen. The chick record shows 286 reared with a present value of \$310.

The dairy cow project showed that three Jersey cows were used, all valuable animals. Two registered Jersey heifers, under charge of Charles Wilcox, son of R. B. Wilcox, principal of the Summers school, freshened last April, produced 509.82 pounds of butter fat. An accurate daily record was made on the two by weighing and testing of the milk for a period of six months. Average daily production of butter fat per cow was 1.415 pounds, a net gain of \$485.33 showing at the end of the six months test including the increased value of the cows and offspring.

County Club Agent Sexton says that next year, he will attempt to start many pig clubs for a better pork production in this county. The dairy herd record club work is being compiled now and will be ready for public information later this week. The work of this project was especially fine, Sexton said, and plans for an extensive course next year are being considered now. The annual report must be in the state leader's hands by November 25. Klamath county ranks high in the state despite its small number of club members and the county agent is particularly proud of his record of thirteen 100 per cent clubs, out of 15 enrolled.
