FIVE MILLION CHILDREN ARE UNDERFED

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—The National Tuberculosis Association reported today that more than 5,000,000 school children in the United States were suffering from malnutrition. To correct this, the association soon will put into effect an unique plan for instructing these children in correct health habits. The plan has been developed with the aid of Dr. W. R. P. Emerson of Boston, nutrition expert. Each child will be required through his teacher and parents to submit a card indicating daily performance of 11 health chores. The cards read:

I was weighed this week on the day checked (X).

Beside a good breakfast and noon and evening meals, I ate mid-morning and afternoon lunches, as directed.

I ate only wholesome food today, including vegetables, fruit, and at least a pint of milk, as directed; and tried always to eat and drink slowly.

I drank four glasses of water, some before each meal, and drank no tea, coffee, nor any injurious drinks.

I was in bed last night ten or more hours, as directed, windows open.

I rested lying down not less than 35 minutes both this forenoon and this afternoon.

I played in the fresh air today, exercising for the time and in the way directed.

I washed my hands before each meal today.

I brushed my teeth thoroughly after breakfast and after the evening meal.

I took a full bath on each of the days of the week that is checked (X).

By doing these chores for five to fifteen weeks, the child becomes a squire, or knight baronet and is entitled to wear the insignia of the Modern Health Crusade. When he gains normal weight, he may earn advanced honors, by performing standard Modern Health Crusade chores and be admitted to the Health Round Table through physical fitness tests.

GRIGSBY APPOINTED

ON BUDGET COMMITTEE

The county court met Saturday afternoon and among the actions taken was the appointment of B. S. Grigsby to take the place of J. Frank Adams as a member of the county budget committee. Adams was forced to decline the appointment owing to a conflict with personal business. Mr. Grigsby is well known in this county and has accepted the place. The budget committee will sit with the county court next month to fix the amount of money needed for Klamath county expenses during the year 1922.

An order approving the final accounting in the estate of David M. Dann, deceased, was made by the court. An order to pay a dividend to creditors of the late George C. Mitchell was made and Administrator Leslie Rogers was ordered to pay ten per cent of all approved claims. The amount of money on hand was \$861.96.

CHANGE ON CHARGES

FOR RECORDING PLATS

County Clerk Charles R. DeLap has announced that a number of changes have been made in the fees of that office and among them on the recording of plats, the charges will be: on 20 lots or less, \$8.00; 21 to 29 lots, \$7.00; 30 to 49 lots, \$8.50; 50 to 74 lots, \$10; 75 to 100 lots, \$12.00 and over 100 lots, three cents for each additional lot. A charge of \$1.00 additional will be made for the approval of any plat by the county, in addition to the figures given above.

ANNAPOLIS AND WEST POINT EXAMS. OPEN

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—Senator Stanfield will make his 1922 appointments to the Naval Academy at Annapolis and the Military Academy at West Point by means of a competitive examination. This examination will be held for Senator Stanfield by the U. S. Civil Service Commission on December 31, 1921, in Corvallis, Eugene, Hood River, McMinnville, Portland and Salem, Oregon.

Appointments will be made by the Senator according to the grades made by the candidates taking the examination, as reported to him by the examiners of the Civil Service Commission.

There will be two vacancies at the Naval Academy, two principalships and six alternateships; and two principalships and four alternateships at the Military Academy during 1922. The official examinations at Annapolis are held during February and April, 1922, and West Point March 7, 1922. Senator Stanfield has set the date for the competitive examination far ahead in order that those successful therein may have plenty of time to prepare for the official examinations.

The ages of admission to West Point are 17 to 22 years and to Annapolis 16 to 20 years. Any young man of the required age who is a bona fide resident of the State of Oregon is eligible to take the examination. Full particulars regarding same may be had by writing to Hon. Robert N. CITY COUNCIL WILL PASS ON ELECTION RETURNS TONIGHT

The city council will meet this evening at 8 o'clock to receive the official reports of the special refunding bond election Tuesday last, also to check up the returns of the canvassing board, Justice Lem. L. Gagnon, Mayor W. S. Wiley and Police Judge Al Leavitt, who found that

428 affirmative against 111 negative votes had been cast in the election, less than 25 per cent of the registered vote of the city.

There are thirty-nine properties in this city which are ready for sale under the delinquent tax section of the city ordinances and the police judge is preparing the notices of sale for newspaper advertising this week. The mayor said he expected that most of the meeting tonight would be taken up with the proposed sale of the \$65,000 refunding bonds to the three bidders who notified the council prior to the election that they would purchase the entire allotment upon ratification by the popular vote of the Klamath Falls people.

CONSTRUCTING A CATTLE PASS

Tom Dixon, county road supervisor, announced that a cattle pass was being constructed under the bridge near the Lytle ranch about 3 1/2 miles southwest of Bonanza, work starting today. The rock wall will be erected first, then the passage underneath completed. The bridge and pass underneath must conform to the standard set by the state engineer.
