

**Hungry Children  
Fed for by Red Cross**

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 15.—More than 400,000 European children, most of whom for years have never possessed clean and decent clothing, today are wearing warm garments made by the women of America in response to the nationwide appeal by the American Red Cross last spring when the desperate plight of Europe's children was revealed. By the first of the year, when the rigorous winter of Europe is at its height, virtually double this amount will be warmly clad in American-made clothing. Shipments from Red Cross Chapters from Maine to California to the terminal in New York from which the garments are dispatched to Europe is continuing daily and increasing rapidly.

Included in the shipments to date have been 327,339 children's garments and 78,005 layettes. This clothing, supplementing the feeding program of the European Relief Council and the medical welfare work of the American Red Cross among the thousands of suffering children, will be the means of assisting in the saving of thousands of lives.

**Births Exceed Deaths**

Births in Sacramento during October exceeded deaths by 61, according to a report issued by Dr. G. J. Hall, city health officer. There were 150 births and 89 deaths.

**Lumber Output Sixty  
Per Cent. of Capacity**

PORTLAND, Nov. 15.—A lumber manufacturer said that the Portland output of lumber is about 60 per cent of capacity. Local building conditions are very good, and better than for several years. Portland saw-mill plants have enjoyed a little spurt of orders from the middle West, but this seems to have died down. Orders from California and the Orient are fair and almost good.

This gentleman is a strong believer that business will pick up following the Disarmament Conference, as political matters always have a marked effect on building. Railroads are placing some orders, but until they get into better financial condition these orders will not be up to normal. High freight rates are placing Western producers in an unfavorable competing position as compared to Southern mills, and Oregon lumbermen will not come into their own until there is a decided reduction. There is a considerable unemployment, although less in Oregon than elsewhere, which will increase as logging camps shut down on account of winter weather. The camps are for the most part operating, and will continue to do so, as long as the weather is favorable.
