

FARMERS' WEEK AT THE O. A. C.

Farmers who want to mix more science with their farm work in production of the most profitable crops in the most economical way, will be offered the latest and best proved information at the O. A. C. Farmers week this year, Dec. 26-31.

Getting idle lands to work, and working lands into larger and more profitable production through the choice of crops, soil management and wise use of produce, is the man-size problem many Oregon farmers are wrestling with. Labor and science are the two solutions—and the more the science the less the labor needed.

Short courses will be run in some special phases of farming and related subjects as follows:

Two weeks course in fruit and vegetable growing, Dec. 3-17.

Four weeks course in beekeeping, Jan. 30-Feb. 25.

Four weeks course in grading, Jan. 9-21.

Eleven weeks course in tractor mechanics, Jan. 2-March 18.

Eleven weeks course in dairy manufacture, Jan. 2-March 18.

Eleven weeks course in general agriculture, Jan. 2-March 18.

Five months dairy herdsman course, Jan. 3-June 10.

Five days home-makers conference, March 29-25.

CITRUS CROP IS BIGGEST IN CALIFORNIA HISTORY

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 16.—The American public consumed 22,000,000 boxes of California oranges and 4,718,800 boxes of California lemons during the last twelve months, according to the annual report of G. Harold Powell, general manager of the California Fruit Growers' Exchange.

California's citrus crop, the report said, was the largest in history. Powell credited co-operative marketing as being responsible for moving the crop "in the face of conditions that proved disastrous to the sale of practically all staple agricultural crops."
