

WOLF MAKING HIS LAST STAND

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—The wolf is gamely making his last stand in America. Bloody fanged from cattle growers stock, and fighting for his existence against the best traps, rifles, poisons and hunters, he has been cut down in number, until today it is estimated by the United States Biological Survey, that in the Western States, his last refuge, there are probably less than five hundred.

Hunters are fast getting his pelt, through exciting and romantic adventure. In Northeast Wyoming, Uncle Sam's hunters are now intensifying a drive to clean out what is believed to be less than fifty. Since the drive began last spring twenty-four have been killed.

The old system of laying bounties on the heads of wild animals has been found after years of study and experience to be a failure, Dr. A. K. Fisher, in charge of economic investigations of the Biological Survey, says.

"Since 1890 millions of dollars have been spent in bounties," he declared, "and there has never been a case where the bounty did any permanent good."

CHEKA AGENTS REPLACE POLICE THROUGHOUT RUSSIA

MOSCOW.—(By Staff Correspondent of The Associated Press)—Nov. 16.—"If you see a Cheka agent on the right side of the street, take the left side," is a common saying in Russia, showing the fear instilled by the secret police which is credited here with untold crimes and violence. Its agents lock up people, try and execute them at will, according to popular information. As there are no police in Russia, it devolves on this organization to keep the peace and, when necessary, control the Red army.

While traveling through the entire length of Russia, The Associated Press correspondent was shadowed, from city to city, by these agents, but never bothered by them. As in Turkey, their mission was possibly to protect the correspondent and not involve the Soviet government in fresh complications regarding its treatment of Americans.

That the Cheka keeps order is evident from the fact that there is at present order everywhere in Russia, save for bands of robbers among the Don and Kuban Cossacks, calling themselves the Green army and now and then holding up trains in the region between the Black and Caspian seas, along the line from Rostov to Petrovsk.

PROCLAMATION OF MAYOR

I, W. S. WILEY, Mayor of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, by virtue of the authority in me vested by Section 15 of Ordinance No. 554, filed in the Office of the Police Judge, on July 18, 1921, entitled, "An Ordinance providing for the manner of exercising in the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, the Initiative and Referendum powers reserved to the legal voters of every municipality, by Section 1 and Section 1a of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, do hereby proclaim that the proposed amendment to the charter of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, the same being denominated Section 310 (a) (b) (c) and (d), submitted to the legal voters of said city at a special election held on Tuesday, the 8th day of November, 1921, received the requisite majority vote entitling the aforesaid amendment to be, and the same hereby is, proclaimed as having been adopted.

I, the said mayor, hereby further proclaim that the proposed amendment submitted to the qualified electors of said city at said election, to-wit:

AN ACT

To amend the charter of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, entitled "A Bill proposed by initiative petition for an act to enact, provide and adopt a charter for the City of Klamath Falls, Klamath County, Oregon, to be submitted to the legal voters of the city of Klamath Falls, Klamath County, Oregon, for their approval or rejection at a special election to be held in said city on the 10th day of March, 1913," submitted to and approved by the legal voters of said city on the 10th day of March, 1913, as subsequently amended by the legal voters of said city at the special election held therein on the 14th day of November, 1916, and as subsequently amended by the legal voters of said city at the special election held therein on the 12th day of August, 1921, and to amend all other amendments thereto, said section 310 reading as follows:

Section 310 (a) For the purpose of providing additional funds with which to pay and redeem the \$20,500 City of Klamath Falls Improvement Bonds, dated May 1, 1911, numbered to , which matured May 1, 1921, together with the accrued interest thereon, and also to pay and redeem the City of Klamath Falls Improvement Bonds, dated October 1, 1921, which matured October 1, 1921, numbered to , aggregating \$26,658.51, together with accrued interest thereon, and also to pay and redeem the City of Klamath Falls Improvement Bonds, dated April 1, 1922, numbered to , aggregating \$12,501.56, together with ac-

crued interest thereon, the Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, is hereby authorized and empowered to issue and dispose of general obligation refunding bonds of said city in the sum of \$65,000 in denominations of \$1,000 or \$500 each, duly signed by the mayor and countersigned by the Police Judge, under the corporate seal of the city, having semi-annual interest coupons thereto attached bearing the engraved facsimile signatures of the Mayor and Police Judge, whereby the city shall be held in substance and effect to undertake to pay the bearer of each of said bonds at maturity thereof the sum therein named in gold coin of the United States of the present standard of value with interest thereon in like gold coin at the rate of 6 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, said bonds to be known as City of Klamath Falls Refunding Bonds, said bonds to be dated November 1, 1921, and to mature in not to exceed twenty years from date of issue, principal and interest to be payable at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Oregon in New York City.

(b) The debt limitations contained in the charter of said city shall not apply to the bonds hereby authorized.

(c) Said bonds shall be sold by the Council as in its judgment may be best, and the surplus, if any, over the amount necessary to redeem the aforesaid improvement bonds, derived from the sale thereof, shall be paid into the general fund of the city.

(d) The purchaser or purchasers of said bonds shall in no wise be required to see to the application of the purchase money therefor.

Received 428 votes for, and 111 votes against.

That said amendment having received a majority of all votes cast at said election for and against adoption, and it further appearing from such canvass that said amendment received a total of 428 affirmative votes, I, the mayor aforesaid, hereby proclaim, in view of the fact that from the canvass duly made, wherein it appears that only 111 negative votes were cast for said amendment, that said amendment has been duly adopted by the qualified voters of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon.
