TEST CASE ON BONUS LAW SET FOR NOV. 22

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 18.—The state supreme court has set November 22 as the date for hearing the case of Boyd against the state bonus and loan commission, which will test the validity of the state bonus and loan act for ex-service men. The bonus commission has set the date of the sale of the initial issue of \$10,000,000 in bonds November 30 and a postponement of the date will be necessary if the decision is not announced before that date.

As soon as the court's opinion is received, if it holds the act valid, the commission will be ready at once to pass on a large number of applications. These will have been examined during the time pending the court's opinion and can be acted on without delay.

It is understood that about 2,000 applications for cash bonus will first be acted upon and an equal number of loan applications also will be ready.
