**FUNDS ON HAND FOR HIGHWAY IMPROVEMENT**

"Road improvements have progressed extremely well in Klamath county despite the fact that money was scarce for the program contemplated some time ago, and while no money had been voted for road improvements since the war, but little fault could be found with the constructive plans which have been under way since then," said Judge R. H. Bunnell yesterday.

In discussing the work accomplished, the judge said that about one-half of the California-Deschutes county highway was completed; a contract for the construction of ten miles on the cross county road from Ashland to Lake county had been let and that the work had just started, the state contributing \$40,000, Klamath county a like sum for the job; the road from the original old Fort Klamath to Crater Lake, a distance of approximately eleven miles, six miles to the forest line then five miles through to the government entrance to the park, was now all mapped out for finishing as soon as spring comes.

Judge Bunnell also added that Klamath county was bonded only to the extent of two per cent of its assessed valuation of \$31,000,000, and that the Dalles-Klamath highway project was one which should be made the most intensive work upon it, and that preparations were to be made for floating a bond issue to carry on the project.

Klamath county will have a surplus fund resulting from the sale of gasoline during the past year of at least \$5,000, after deducting \$17,500, being the interest due on \$374,000 road-improvement bonds issued in the past.

The interest on the outstanding bonds being taken care of yearly, the year ends great accomplishment in the county work in the making up of contemplated road building programs during the past 1921.
