## OREGON HOP CROP ESTIMATED

THREE AND A HALF MILLIONS  
SALEM, Nov. 22.—F. W. Durbin,  
a local hop grower and representative  
of the Marion County Realty Association  
estimated the 1921 hop crop  
in Oregon at a value of \$5,525,000.  
The quantity of the crop was estimated  
at 10,840,000 pounds. The price  
ranged from 50 to 60 cents a pound.

PHONE RELICS  
SHOWS GROWTH  
OF SYSTEM

From an old trunk formerly owned  
by George C. Maynard, who established  
the first telephone system in  
Washington, D. C., some interesting  
relics of the early days of the telephone  
at the national capital have  
been brought to light by the editor  
of the Transmitter, published by the  
Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone  
Company.

Not the least interesting item in an  
inventory of the telephone lines  
maintained by Maynard in Washington  
after his enterprise was undertaken.

These lines include: "Brick yard,  
gas office, Wheatley's State Dept. to  
President's Ho., President's Ho. to Treasury  
Dept., Treasury Dept. to Agric. Dept.,  
and the Med. Mus. to Surg. Gen's  
Office," for a total of 72,911 feet or  
13.8 miles.

Some indication of the remarkable  
development of the telephone in less  
than half a century is afforded in the  
fact that this crude system, has grown  
until the company of which it was the  
forerunner now has 1,085,974 miles  
of overhead and underground wires.

## OREGON BREVITIES

450 Guide Boards Erected  
EUGENE.—In the season 450  
road and trail guide boards were  
erected within the Cascade National  
Forest, said N. F. Macduff, supervisor  
of this forest. This is a larger  
number than was erected in any  
other national forest in this state  
except the Oregon forest, said Mr.  
Macduff.

in Victoria, B. C.

Mule Shoes Grow on Trees  
JACKSONVILLE.—It surely is

proof of very rich soil that grows

south of town this week, Charley  
McCabe found a manzanita tree  
with a mule shoe embedded in it,  
a real curiosity. The shoe had evidently  
been thrown in the tree,  
when it was a small twig—perhaps  
many years ago, when Jacksonville  
was the liveliest mining town on  
earth—and as it grew it even took  
the form of a mule's leg and hoof,  
where the shoe was embedded.

INCREASE FORCE ON  
ROGUE RIVER CANAL

MEDFORD, Nov. 22.—The Rogue  
River Valley Canal company has established  
three new construction  
camps of fifty men each near the  
town of Lake Creek. The men will  
be engaged all winter in enlarging  
the canal and constructing dams  
at the north and south forks of Little  
Butte creek. This will increase the  
number of camps conducted by the  
company to eleven and the number  
of men employed to 450.

U. S. TO LEASE BUT  
NOT SELL OIL LANDS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—Secretary  
Fall today promulgated an opinion  
denying application for mining  
patent of the Honolulu Consolidated  
Oil company for 2,040 acres of oil  
land in Naval Petroleum Reserve No.  
2, in California, thus permanently  
retaining the Government free title  
to the lands and their oil and gas  
deposits.

The lands, however, will be leased  
on a royalty basis.
