CIRCUIT COURT

A default order has been made in the divorce petition brought by Birdie Lins against Charles Lins.

An order overruling the defendant's demurrer in the case of Bank of Lakeview against W. T. Garrett, Mary E. and Richard M. Glynn, has been entered of record in this case by Judge Kuykendall.

Order of publication of summons has been made by the court in the suit of H. N. Moe against W. R. Anderson and L. E. Decker.

A complaint has been filed by the Gun Store against S. D. P. P. and D. P. Parks, alleging that a bill of goods amounting to \$271.65 has not been paid. The complaint was filed August 5 and return made to the circuit clerk Wednesday.

An order of default has been issued in the suit of F. J. Schmitz, Annie E. Anderson and Carrie E. Anderson, doing business under the firm name of "The Beauty Store" against Anita Larabee Lowry wherein a judgment of \$2,000 contracted April 9, 1921, with interest at 8 per cent and attorney fees of \$200 is ordered collected.

Eugene McAniff, a shepherd, has filed a complaint against John F. Burke and the Klamath Livestock Mortgage company alleging that he has had no pay for herding 1300 head of sheep from February 1, 1920 to November 5, 1921. The plaintiff alleges that he was to have \$125 for the first four months, then \$100 a month afterwards. Plaintiff claims \$1200 with interest at 6 per cent from February 1, 1920, \$5 filing fees and \$250 attorney fees.

An order of court has been made granting leave to amend the plaintiff's complaint in the suit of Ivan Lee Humphrey, a minor, by his guardian ad litem, Richard D. Humphrey against the Sprague River Lumber company.
