

RATHER HANG THAN SERVE LIFE IN PRISON

SALEM, Ore. Nov. 25.—Penitentiary officials have received a telegram from The Dalles to the effect that Abe Evans, now in the state prison here awaiting execution for the murder of James Doran, has been granted until January 10 to perfect an appeal to the supreme court. The action of The Dalles court automatically stays the execution set for December 2.

Evans recently said that he would not appeal his case to the supreme court. He declared that he preferred hanging to passing the remainder of his days within the penitentiary walls.

Mrs. Evans later gave out a statement here that she had notified her husband's attorneys to perfect an appeal.

PROSECUTED FOR GAME VIOLATION

Ernie Hosley, John Hunsaker, Charles Martin and Orville Vaughn were picked up Sunday night by Game Warden Stout near Merrill and brought to this city on a charge of "night hunting," shooting wild fowl after sunset. When two of the men were tried, Charles Martin and Ernie Hosley paid \$25 and costs in Justice Gaghagen's court Monday. John Hunsaker pleaded guilty to the charge yesterday in the same court and was fined a like sum, while Orville Vaughn will be tried tomorrow on the charge as soon as he returns from Weed.

The justice considered that sufficient publicity had been furnished hunters by the game warden, and as tables were published in the newspapers showing the hours of sunset and sunrise, the hunters had no valid excuse for violating the known law. As the men were up for their first offense, the minimum fine was given them accordingly.

In commenting on the case, Secretary William McNealy of the Klamath Sportsmen's association stated that the practice of late shooting was detrimental to game remaining in Klamath hunting spots, for when shots are fired at flying fowls after dark, when they are seeking roosting places; they go high and leave the country. Shooting from automobiles had the same effect when flocks were passing overhead, and as the machine on fair road could keep pace for a distance with the fowl, the scare was as bad as that of night shooting, the birds taking to the heights for southern places. Both practices must be abandoned for the sake of sport, McNealy declared.

McNealy also stated that the offenses are both punishable by a federal as well as a state fine and the men arrested Sunday night escaped very lightly. Had the federal charge been pressed, the men would have been taken before the United States Commissioner, bound over to the federal grand jury at Portland, been to the trouble of securing high bail, then bear their own expenses to Portland to stand trial, with a possible heavy fine very likely all expenses running up into the hundreds of dollars. In the interest of true sport, McNealy urges the hunters to stick inside the law and not drive the birds south ahead of time.

OIL GUSHER BROUGHT IN AT LONG BEACH

LONG BEACH, Calif., Nov. 25.—Booth No. 1 well of the San Martinez Oil company, in the Signal Hill district, near here, has been brought in as a gusher flowing between 3,000 and 4,000 barrels a day, according to officials of the company.

NO DATE ANNOUNCED FOR COURTHOUSE TRIAL

Charles Stone, attorney for Frank Ward, taxpayer, against the County Court, et al, stated that Hon. G. F. Skipworth of the Thirteenth Judicial district had not announced the date for the trying of the case. When the trial judge was ready to hear the case, Stone said, the attorneys for both sides would be notified but the date first announced in the newspapers, December 5, was not the official trial date.

FOREST RANGERS TRAVEL BY MOTOR BOAT

A forest ranger who rides a motor boat instead of a horse would be a novelty in the Western States, but is the rule in the Tongass National Forest, Alaska.

The Tongass National Forest is completely equipped with an admirable system of waterways. Here, instead of saddle and pack horse, the ranger rides a seagoing motor boat. He guides his steed by means of a wheel instead of reins; feeds it gasoline instead of oats; tethers it at night with an anchor in some sheltered cove instead of with a picket rope in a mountain meadow, and uses the paint brush in lieu of a curry comb.

PUBLIC UTILITIES ARE TAXED A \$123,311,472.

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 25. — Public utilities of Oregon will pay taxes the coming year on at total apportioned property valuation in the state of \$123,311,472.13, according to a statement made public by the state tax commission. This figure for the 1921 roll is \$666,328.16 less than that of 1920. This reduction is due to lower rates, and it is notwithstanding the fact that the full value of the utilities this year as fixed by the state tax commission is \$4,447,794.76 more than last year. The full value for 1920 was \$181,057,000.53 and

for this year \$185,504,795.29. The total apportioned value of the utilities combined with the general assessed property valuation of the state makes the total assessed property valuation in Oregon about \$1,020,000,000.
