MAMMOTH TRACTOR FOR TULE LANDS

The biggest tractor ever brought to this city arrived over the Southern Pacific this week. It was purchased in California by J. C. Walsh, who has been farming the Klamath Land & Livestock Co. land near Keno. It is to be used in plowing the south unit of reclaimed tule land on the Upper lake, which Mr. Walsh has leased from the California Oregon Power company. The tract consists of 2700 acres.

The machine is a mammoth affair. The drive wheels have a face of about four feet. It weighs 40,000 pounds, is operated by steam and is 110 horsepower. Mr. Walsh says it is constructed with a view of preventing it becoming mired in the soft tule ground upon which it is to be used.

In keeping with the bigness of the machine, Mr. Walsh has purchased four of the largest plows ever used in the county. They weight 2,000 pounds each or 8,000 pounds in all. These were bought from J. W. Kerns, the local representative for the Moline Plow company.
