

FRUITS ROT WHEN 12,000 GO ON STRIKE

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 25.—Twelve thousand men, black and white, engaged in longshore work, went on strike this morning and as a consequence, the port is entirely tied up. The strike is a sympathetic one, the cotton screwmen having gone out last week.

The men who work along the levee, loading and unloading the vessels at this port have one of the strongest union organizations in this country. It is unique in the fact that the negro membership is greater than the white but they have always worked in harmony, the union being officered entirely by white men.

The situation is exceptionally serious in that at this time there the levee-woof (lots on) are a number of vessels docked at the levee loaded with fruit from South America for Chicago, New York and interior points, and unless these cargoes are immediately discharged for transshipment they will be a total loss, as the fruit is not in cold storage and ripens and rots very quickly.

34TH DECORATION FOR SOLDIER OF FORTUNE

MANILA, P. I., Nov. 12.—(By Mail)—Samuel I. Johnson, former brigadier general of the national guard of Hawaii and former major of the 27th United States Infantry, today added two more decorations to the twenty-two which he already possessed. He received the Distinguished Service Cross from the United States government and the fourth class of the Imperial Order of Meiji from Japan, both decorations for distinguished service at Vladivostok during the allied occupation in 1919 and 1920 when he was in charge of the international police force there.

He is a Russian by birth, has fought under many flags and has received decorations from nearly every civilized country in the world. When the United States entered the war he resigned his commission as brigadier general of the Hawaiian national guard and enlisted as a private. A short time later he was commissioned as major in the 17th United States Infantry and was sent to Siberia.

The American citation reads: "For extraordinary heroism in action at Vladivostok, Siberia on the night of November 17-18, 1919. On three successive occasions he went through a zone swept by the intense fire of contending factions to the railroad station and brought out non-combatants through the continuous fire from rifles and machine guns."

Mrs. Johnson, whom the major had not seen for five years arrived from the United States on the steamer Creole State one hour before there ceremony took place and was enabled to see her husband receive his 34th decoration.

Major Johnson resigned from the army about a year ago and is now manager of a lumber company at Cadiz, Occidental Negros, in the Visayan group of the Philippine Islands.

THOUSANDS OF VETS AIDED BY THE "CLEAN-UP" SQUAD

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—Marked success has attended the "clean-up" campaign instituted by the Veterans Bureau, in which the American Red Cross and the American Legion are cooperating. A report from the Veterans' Bureau shows that more than 24,000 former soldiers have been interviewed by members of the various squads. As a result more than 46,000 claims for compensation have been filed. Of this number only 3,000 cases are pending, the remainder having been adjusted. The clean-up squads have visited more than 1,150 cities and their work is rapidly nearing completion. An appropriation of \$219,000 was made by the American Red Cross to carry out its part of the "clean-up" program.
