HERO OF WAR HAS BIG HOPES OF CONFERENCE

CORVALLIS, Dec. 5.—More important results than the people realize may come from the present disarmament conference, in the opinion of Howard M. Wight, world war hero of Corvallis who was one of the three ex-service men to represent Oregon at the burial of the unknown soldier in Washington on Armistice day. Mr. Wight, now a member of the O. A. C. faculty, has just returned to this city after an absence of three weeks in the east.

"When I started back to Washington three weeks ago, I felt, as did many other ex-service men that the results of the war were not what had been promised or what could reasonably be expected," said Mr. Wight today. "We had fought to end war and yet the Peace conference at Paris and the attitude of our country afterward left but little apparent improvement. I had no more than reached Washington, however, and talked with men of vision there than I saw that something important was coming. From then on the very spirit of the occasion was a guarantee of results. Now I have much more confidence in the ultimate outcome than I had three weeks ago."

"The formal burial of the representative of America's unknown dead in the historic Arlington cemetery was by far the most impressive ceremony I ever witnessed," said Mr. Wight. "It came at a wonderful time, on the day preceding the opening of the world conference. Here was a man being buried who symbolized not only the unknown dead but the suffering and sacrifice of the entire war. Thousands of Americans stood with bowed heads mourning the nation's loss—yet not a loss but the working out of a sacrifice and gift."

AMERICAN FORESTATION FOR WAR-SCARRED EUROPE

American seedlings, fast growing into mighty trees, already are beginning to heal the war scarred areas of Europe. Not only are they being nurtured in France and Belgium but in Great Britain also and in Ireland.

The French ministry has ordered that the seedlings shall be located in places readily accessible to main traveled roads, and if possible, near well known sites "with the view that such future forests shall remain as a monument to the partnership of France and America in the Great War." The same sentiment also prevails in Great Britain which actually lost more forest cover than any other country by the sudden demands of war for materials. In Belgium in the once beautiful Ardennes where the German axe left nothing standing the beautiful American Douglas fir is lifting its head.
