AMERICAN LEGION FIGHTING PARSON WINS ANOTHER WAR

CHANUTE, Kan., Dec. 19.—The fighting instinct which won for the Rev. Earl A. Blackman, the newly elected national chaplain of the American Legion, the title of the "Fighting Parson of the Thirty-fifth" during the world war, has stood him well in hand since he came back to his peace-time vocation as pastor of the First Christian church here. Enlightenment gained in his war service created new ideas as to the scope of religious activities. The new planks he inserted in the church's platform created considerable opposition. But thus far the "fighting parson" has won.

Career Diversified The career of the Rev. Mr. Blackman has been diversified. He was born in Kendallville, Ind., October 2, 1882, on a farm, and received a common school education. He studied steam and machine designing in Pratt institute, Brooklyn, N. Y.; followed engineering and electrical work, including firing a locomotive; assistant engineer on a steam yacht in New York harbor; chief engineer of an interurban power house in Northern Indiana, and worked in an automobile factory thus far the "fighting parson" has tory at Kokomo, Ind.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 12.—Chief Strong Coffee, Klamath Indian, was figuring on changing his name to Chief Arnica today, as a result of being pulled over many rocks and three waterfalls in the Klamath river, near Orleans, Cal., by a heavy-weight champion sturgeon, the United States forestry service here was advised.

Strong Coffee started out with a sturgeon harpoon lashed to his waist. He made a perfect shot and the sturgeon fell into a tailspin, dragging Strong Coffee down stream with it. Other Indians cut him loose as he was heading straight for Japan and making around 30 knots.

The yarn comes from H. R. Sexton, ranger in the Klamath national forest, who swears that it is not a "fish story."
