SIX REEL SUPER FEATURE AT THE STRAND TONIGHT.

A six-reel super-production will be seen at the Strand theatre tonight in "The Blue Pearl," a play replete with thrills, and with a setting which will please the most exacting patrons.

The story of "The Blue Pearl" revolves around the disappearance of a blue pearl worn by a woman who has a high social position although she is an adventuress. While at a social dinner the pearl disappears. One of the guests is a Police Commissioner. He immediately conducts an inquiry on the spot. Suspicion clearly points, and is well grounded, to everyone present. The police take every precaution, and yet are baffled. Every one is carefully searched. They are unable to pin the crime on any single individual, even though no one has left the room. The audience is shown the latest methods employed by the police in investigating crimes, and sit in breathless suspense as they watch developments. The mantle of guilt, according to the police, covers each and everyone in the assembly. The process of elimination is so wonderfully directed and picturized that it is a human impossibility for anyone who has not seen the picture or the play, to pick the guilty one.

The cast is composed of only such actors as are in the very first rank on the spoken stage and who have also made big hits in big screen productions. Edith Hallor plays the leading role and is no new star on the screen as she had been featured by William Fox in a number of productions. She played the title role in George Ade's comedy, "Leave It To Jane" during its successful run at the Longacre Theatre, New York. Florence Billings has appeared prominently in productions made by Pathe, Famous Players, World, and has lately starred in "The Heart of a Gypsy." Fair Blinney, who also plays a conspicuous part will be remembered for her fine work in "Open Your Eyes." Lumsden Hare, leading man with Belasco and Frohman productions and also with Grace George, adds strength to the notable cast.

In addition two good comedy films will be shown.

Tomorrow and Sunday patrons will be given a rare treat in Jack and Kitty Lee, Hawaiian singers, musicians and dancers. "The Blue Pearl" will be repeated tomorrow while on Sunday "Lavender and Old Lace" will be shown.

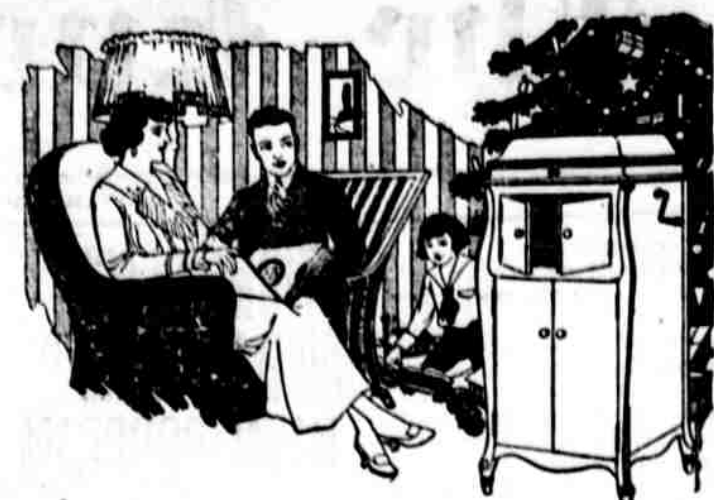
