NEW SAVINGS CERTIFICATE ISSUED BY TREASURY DEPT.

The treasury department of the United States is issuing a brand new form of treasury savings certificate which will make a most sensible and acceptable Christmas gift.

This new certificate is issued in denominations of \$25, \$100 and \$1,000. Each certificate matures in five years from its date of purchase, is registered in the owner's name, and can be cashed at short notice at any time before maturity at its current value. These certificates are sold at the flat rate of \$20 for the \$25 certificate; \$80 for the \$100 certificate, and \$800 for the \$1,000 certificate.

These certificates are on sale through the banks and postoffices since December 15, 1921.

The old issue of the \$5 war savings stamp together with the thrift stamps will be discontinued December 31, 1921. The new certificate will be sold in their stead.

These new certificates are tax exempt except estate and inheritance tax, federal income tax and excess or war profit taxes.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—Court action to close three Louisville, Kentucky breweries on ground that they are distributing a beverage containing more than the legal amount of alcohol, will be sought. Federal Prohibition headquarters announced.

VOTE RUSSIAN RELIEF

Bill Authorizing Expenditure of \$20,000,000 Passed by House

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19.—A bill authorizing the President to expend \$20,000,000 out of the funds of the United States Grain Corporation for relief of the distressed and starving people of Russia, was passed Saturday night by the house, 114 to 51.

Opponents of the measure forced a roll call on the ground that the vote as announced did not include a quorum. The roll call resulted 181 to 71, and the bill goes to the senate.

In two hours of debate over the measure the house attempted to chop it to pieces with amendments. The first test was on an amendment to reduce the amount from 20 million to 10 million, which was defeated 78 to 60. Protesting against use of funds for the people of any foreign nation, Chairman Madden of the appropriations committee, said it was easy to vote a tax on the heads of the American people and cry at the same time for economy. "There are conditions of distress in this country, which would appal congress if I related them," he shouted.
