UNEMPLOYED GET AID

Work is Given by Large Amount of Schools Being Built

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 27.—Figures made public today by the President's Conference on Unemployment show that an enormous amount of school construction is under way and that a larger additional amount has been authorized as one of the means to give immediate relief to the nation's unemployed.

Secretary Hoover of the Department of Commerce called upon the educational leaders of the nation among the first to do their share in the movement to relieve unemployment. Not only was aid asked for the jobless, by means of a program of school building but also a campaign was started by school children to find the millions of small jobs their parents might have—chores about the farm, buildings to be cleaned or

DRY CAMPAIGN TO BE WAGED IN QUEENSLAND

Prohibitionists Defeated at Last Election Will Make Another Effort

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Dec. 28.—Falling short of making Queensland, Australia, bone dry by but 30,000 votes in its first attempt three years ago, the Prohibition Foundation of America, has begun a campaign in that province which they declare will terminate when the liquor question is again voted on in 1923 there.

W. G. Calderwood, for the past 26 years a leader of the prohibition forces in Minnesota, and candidate for United States Senator on two occasions, has been chosen by the Foundation to organize the dry forces in Queensland and to wage a ceaseless campaign there. He will remain in the Australian province until the question is voted upon, when he will journey to India and China, where he also will engage in similar work.

Queensland is about one-fourth as large as the United States. Dry forces brought the liquor question to a vote there three years ago, with the result that prohibition failed by some 30,000 votes, according to George F. Wells, of this city, a member of the Foundation.

Subsequently, the United States and Canada have banned liquor, Mr. Wells stated, and in his opinion this makes the prospect for bringing Queensland into the dry column much brighter.

NEW PHONE PROJECTS

Program Calls for Expenditure of \$12,540 in Klamath

PORTLAND, Dec. 28.—With an ex-

tensive program for the improvement and extension of telephone exchanges in cities of Oregon outside of Portland, the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company will enter the new year with projects under way in seven cities and immediate plans for four other municipalities, according to an announcement made Saturday by C. E. Hickman, division commercial superintendent. The total amount to be spent on these projects is \$250,150.

dams for the reservoir at Thompson Valley, 12 miles south of here, and on the diversion dam three miles southwest, both of which are being built by Otto Hanson of Spokane, under supervision of H. G. Deales, who now has a crew of 70 men at work.

The foundations have been completed by sinking a trench the full width of the creek, and embedding a concrete core eighteen inches deep, with posts extending to the top of the dam for lumber facing.

Each dam will rise 46 feet above the level of the creek. Lumber for facing the reservoir dam now is on the ground, and that for the diversion dam is being placed on the site.

On the lower side of the dams are to be rock fills to support this facing. At the reservoir dam there is to be a tunnel through solid rock 225 feet, six by eight feet, which is to have two headgates, to control the supply for irrigating.

It is intended that the system be in working order for the 1922 crops.
