OREGON BREVITIES

PORTLAND—Italian gardeners to erect three-story market building.  
Marshfield—Coss County lumber cut for 1921, 225,000,000 board feet. Port Orford cedar brought \$1,750,000. Dairy products \$750,000. Improvements in county total \$1,900,000.  
Capital invested in Oregon industries increased from \$139,500,000 in 1914 to \$439,982,000 in 1919. Salaries and wages paid increased from \$26,515,000 to \$34,986,000. Grand total value Oregon products 1921 \$296,805,000. Total amount spent on roads in 1921 \$18,250,000.  
Powers—The Smith Powers Logging Co. has 700 men on its payroll. Bond lumber output for 1921, 112,000,000 feet.  
Lafayette has moving picture theatre.  
Butte Valley irrigation district to cost \$1,000,000.  
Portland slices salaries of school janitors \$40,000.  
Eugene Masonic orders plan \$150,000 temple.  
Tillamook lumber cut 1921 120,000,000 feet, value \$2,000,000.  
Roseburg—3,155,000 prune trees being planted to increase acreage.  
Portland—3 new ships arrive to take oriental cargoes.  
Eugene—Machinery factory increases capital to \$50,000.  
Scappoose has new 20,000 ft. capacity planing mill.  
Big Medford irrigation district to be completed and have water for 1922.  
Portland—Honeyman Hardware Co.'s building to be remodeled at cost of \$25,000.  
Marshfield—Menasha Woodware Co. plans woodworking establishment.  
Astoria—\$250,000 paid for Clatsop Lumber Co.'s sawmill, planing mills and dry kilns.  
Roseburg—Taxpayers league slashes budget advising decreases in nearly all departments. Propose that county commissioners be placed on full time and handle work instead of relegating important affairs to clerks; clerk hire is eliminated.  
Pendleton—Cost of municipal government not to exceed its income this year.  
Brookings—California & Oregon Lumber Co. start construction work on their new logging camps in redwoods near Smith River.  
Salem—State highway commission will receive bids Jan. 10 for sale of \$1,000,000 of 5 percent state highway bonds.  
Corvallis General Hospital, costing \$75,000, to open Jan. 1.  
Coss county tax budget shows increase of \$33,000 over budget year ago.  
Klamath Falls—Fire department to get 10,000 gal. engine pump, cost \$13,000.  
Seaside—\$4500 sewer contract awarded.  
Ranier—Menefee mill to resume operations employing 60 men.  
\$350,000 Elk Rock Tunnel between Portland and Oswego completed.  
Milton—Construction of new telephone line to begin soon.  
Mapleton—Cushman road, 13 miles long and costing \$60,000, to be completed by fall.  
Marshfield—Front street paving to cost \$47,000.  
Central Coal and Coke Co., a Kansas concern, to start development in spring, of vast Echo tract, located in western Columbia and eastern Clatsop counties.  
Hood River—Work resumed on Booth Hill section of Loop Road.  
Crane—Storage reservoir to be constructed on Trout Creek, cost \$100,000.  
Astoria—Clatsop mill to begin work in January, employing 130 men.  
Eugene—New school house to be built at Siltcoos.  
Forest Grove votes \$50,000 bond issue to pay off indebtedness of city.  
Portland—Contract awarded for 25,000 fire brick for use in relining furnaces at municipal incinerator.
