FARM POINTERS
Conditions are ripe for greatly increased drainage activity in Oregon with improved labor conditions and the probability of extension of federal reclamation work to drainage, says W. L. Powers, chief of soils at the O. A. C. Experiment station.

Picking out the good cows in cow testing association work brought up average production 104 pounds of milk and 2.46 pounds butter fat for all Oregon association cows in November over that of the same month a year earlier. This shows healthy growth and some of the possibilities of testing for the good cows," says E. B. Pitts, federal O. A. C. extension dairyman.

Advertising space in local and trade papers is an effective method of publicity that is often neglected by the breeder. Selling purebred livestock and getting it to work is just as important as raising it, and several methods of advertising have to be employed to do this—O. A. C. Extension Service.

In the big alfalfa-growing counties such as Umatilla, Morrow, Crook, Deschutes, Klamath and Melheur, there are fine possibilities for large commercial dairies. Especially attractive opportunities for beginners are found in these districts just under irrigation, as but few bees and bee-diseases are present there. Openings for bee-keeping on a commercial scale are also found in mountain regions where fire-weed, willowherb, grows abundantly, and where good roads make progress and access easy—O. A. C. Extension service.

Choice of breed is first consideration in starting a new dairy herd. Kind of cattle in the community, form in which the dairy products were to be marketed, climate, feed supply and personal choice, are to be considered.

"Watch us grow" might well be the slogan of the 2537 cows in cow testing association work in Oregon during November, since the increased average production was 104 pounds of milk and 2.46 pounds of fat over the average for November a year earlier.

The average yield of milk was 571.23 pounds and of fat 27 1/2 pounds—almost one pound a day in the late fall month.

The Rogue River association herds made the highest association average—34.66 pounds of fat as compared with the total average of 27 1/2 pounds.

Tillamook had the largest number of cows—1040—the most honor cows giving more than 40 pounds of fat—104—and the highest individual cow, Princess, a registered Holstein giving 2737 pounds of milk with 84.85 pounds of fat—well on to 3 pounds a day.

The highest grade cow was Butler & McEntire's Rost, a grade Jersey making a record of 75.5 pounds of fat.

The big gain in production, which represents almost clear profit to the owners, was brought about by weeding out low produce using better sires to build up the herd, and giving the animals scientific feeding, housing, and care.

A series of dairy meetings in the vicinity of each of the associations is planned for the present year, reports E. B. Pitts, federal and O. A. C. field dairyman in charge. These meetings will be held on the farms, and the big producing cows will be used in demonstrations.

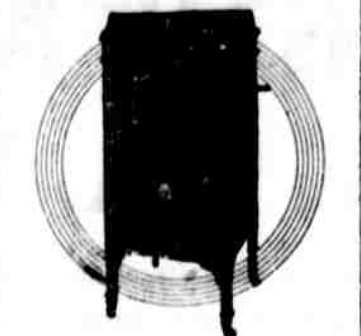
