"The County Agent's Creed." is the title of an interesting article which has been sent to all county agents in the United States by the department of agriculture, as follows:

"I love the big out-of-doors; the smell of the soil; the touch of the rain; the smile of the sun; the kiss of the wind; the song of the birds and the laughter of the summer breezes in the trees.

"I love the growing crops, the rustle of the corn; the golden billow of the ripening wheat; the fleecy cot-

ton bursting from the boll; the musky odor of the ripening fruit and the shimmer of the grass that is blue.

"I love God's creatures great and small that minister to man's needs; the friendship of the horse, the confidence of the sheep; the gentleness of the cow and the contented confidence of the fattening swine. These represent the response of service to kindness and care.

"Because I love these things, I believe in the open country and the life of country people; in their hopes, their aspirations and their simple faith; in their own lives and plan for the happiness of those that love.

"I believe in the farmer as the nation's sure defense; the reservoir of its prosperity; its have of security from those who would despoil it from within or without.

"I believe in the farmer's right to a comfortable living; to such recompense for his capital and labor and skill as will make him the peer of those who work in office, shop or mine, in his right to co-operate with his neighbors for the security of his business life.

"I believe in the sacredness of the farmer's home; in the holiness of the country woman's love and the opportunity that home should assure to culture, grace and power.

"I believe in the country boy and girl; in their longing for opportunity and their right to trained minds; healthy bodies and clean hearts, and to the country's call and claim to their service.

"I believe in work, in the glory of service and the benediction of duty honestly discharged.

"I believe in my own work, the opportunity it offers to be helpful, and in its touch of human sympathy and its joy of common fellowship.

"I believe in the public institutions, of which I am a part, in their right to my loyalty and my enthusiasm in extending the established principles and ideals of those who seek and find the truth.

"I believe in myself, in humility, but with sincerity of purpose I offer to work with country man, woman and child in making the farm prosperous, the country home comfortable and beautiful and the rural community satisfying and my own life useful.

"Because I love these things, and believe these things, I am a county agent."

BOOKS GO TO MEDFORD Will of Colonel Sargent Leaves 167 Volumes to Library

MEDFORD, Jan. 17.—It has been announced that the late Colonel H. H. Sargent, widely known army officer and prominent Medford and Jacksonville citizen, in his will bequeathed 167 volumes of essays, letters, books of biography, travel and high-class fiction to the public library of Medford.

Colonel Sargent, who was an authority and author of world fame in military strategy and other military subjects left his military works, comprising 400 volumes, to Blackburn university at Carlinville, Ill., from which institution he was graduated as a young man.

The late Colonel Sargent was a brother-in-law of Captain O. C. Applegate of Klamath Falls.

CHROME BOOKLET ISSUED

MEDFORD, Jan. 17.—The department of the interior has issued a bulletin on the "Deposits of Chromite in Oregon, Washington and Montana," the information therein being compiled by J. S. Diller, L. G. Westgate and J. T. Pardee. The bulletin gives an exhaustive survey of the Klamath mountains chrome deposits, and relative to Jackson county says: "The total chrome ore shipped from Jackson county in 1915 was only 168 tons, and the reported amount of stock on hand was small."
