### TREE MOSS AND PINE NEEDLES ARE UTILIZED

Sale of tree moss and pine needles in a new line of activity opened up by the United States forest service.

Notice was received by L. A. Barrett, chief assistant forester, that an enterprising resident of Sonora had arranged to purchase moss at \$2 a ton, he to gather it himself from cut trees in the national forests. Experiments are being made with the moss in San Francisco to dye it red and blue. The product is disposed of at florist establishments.

A local firm has been making arrangements with the forestry officials to locate a manufactory in one of the national forests, where immense quantities of pine needles are available. From the needles will be distilled essence to be used in making cough drops and other medicinal products.

### REMOVAL OF TRACK RECALLS LUMBER BOOM

RED BLUFF, Jan. 19.—A relic of the days, many years ago, when Red Bluff was an important center of a thriving lumber business, is to disappear with the tearing up of the railroad track on Oak street from the Southern Pacific yards to Main Street. A crew of workmen from the Pacific Gas and Electric Company is busily engaged in removing the rails and ties and leveling up the street.

### RARE GRASSES ARE FOUND BY RANGERS IN SISKIYOU MTS.

Forest rangers in the Siskiyou national forest have made some botanical finds in the 275 specimens of herbs and grasses that were sent back to Washington for identification by the forest services.

The report from Washington received by D. C. Ingram, grazing examiner, to whom the rangers turned over grasses which they could not identify notes, one "discovery of an Old World species that has never been found in this country and never heretofore listed in any manual of American plants.

It is cyperus vegetus, of vigorous cyperus, related to the papyrus of Egypt. The finding of it in the Siskiyou, however, is only one of a number of new discoveries in that remarkable region. "Number 1232" in the list of samples sent is a new lupine, never named or described before.

Of "number 1221", the department declared it could not be identified and nothing like it has ever been found in Oregon before.

Siberian juniper is another Old World species that has been discovered.

The Siskiyou forests appear to be full of the relics of flora of an older geological period; plants and shrubs that, like the redwood, are found nowhere else in the world except as fossil remnants.

This summer's contribution from the forests, with its new finds, will be turned over to the national herbarium.

### BIGGEST GATHERING SINCE BRIAN SEEN IN IRISH CONGRESS

PARIS, Jan. 19.—Promoters of the World Congress of the Irish Race to be held in Paris for one week beginning January 31, says it will be the greatest gathering of the Irish race since King Brian's historic assembly in 1014.

The various methods by which the 25,000,000 persons of Irish blood throughout the world can assist in the economic reconstruction of Ireland made necessary by the years of conflict, will be among the chief problems before the conference. The revival of Irish art, language and literature also will be considered.

One of the large halls in the center of Paris has been obtained for the sessions and an exhibition of Irish art will be held in another hall near the headquarters. The best known Irish artists are sending pictures for the exhibition.

Concurrently with the Congress will be a representation of Irish drama in French in one of the Parisian theaters and a concert of Irish music by one of the best known orchestras in Europe.

Many descendants of Irish exiles of the 17th century who played historic role, in France and other countries have responded to the invitation of the General Secretary, Miss Katharine Hughes, who will be present.

The track was laid about forty-five years ago for the purpose of expediting the then extensive operations of the Sierra Lumber company. At that time the track extended across the Sacramento River bridge and was a big factor in the shipping of millions of feet of timber through Red Bluff to the lumber markets of the world. In later years the business was absorbed by the Diamond Match company. Then came a suspension of the lumber industry here, and for many years the track has been idle. Meanwhile numerous requests have been made for removal of the rails, these requests usually being lodged with the City Trustees.

The property eventually fell into the hands of the Northern California Power Company, and more recently of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company. The Municipal Board a short time ago asked that the track be torn up, and the company proceeded to promptly comply with the request.

### RANGERS WILL DISCUSS FOREST FIRE PREVENTION

ROSEBURG, Jan. 19.—A joint meeting of the forest rangers of the Umpqua, Siskiyou and Crater forests will be held in Roseburg on February 11 and 12 at the local forest service office. These joint meetings are held once every two years and this is the first time Roseburg has been chosen as the meeting place. The meeting is called primarily for the study of plans and data procured to date on the work of range appraisal and to consider matters relating to fire prevention and suppression. About 25 rangers representing the three forests will be present, together with a number of the district officers from Portland and other places throughout the state.

Five South American countries have already indicated a desire to send delegations. These are Brazil, Argentina, Chile, Bolivia, and Peru, while delegations from New Zealand, Tasmania and other remote countries are already on their way.

### 14,000 ACRES FOR SOLDIERS IN WESTERN OREGON

PORTLAND, Jan. 19.—With more lands offered recently for settlement under the soldiers' bonus law, the offerings now total 14,000 acres in Western Oregon, according to an announcement made by Robert O. Case, secretary of the land committee of the American Legion. Of this amount 10,000 acres are near Medford, 2000 near Norton in Benton and Lincoln counties. Numerous inquiries for land are being received from ex-servicemen.
