NEWS OF INTEREST TO KLAMATH LUMBERMEN

HILL FOR FOREST EXPERIMENT WORK

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—Senator Johnson, Republican, California, has introduced in the Senate a bill providing an appropriation of \$40,000 for a forest experiment station in California.

The station, if established, will be under the direction of the United States Forest Service in co-operation with the University of California.

The purpose of the station will be to ascertain the best methods of management for forests and forest lands and for the protection of chaparral growth on water sheds important for irrigation and other purposes.

SCHOOL FOR LUMBER GRADERS TO BE HELD

SUSANVILLE, Jan. 25.—The California Sugar and White Pine Manufacturers' Association will hold its grading school in Lassen County this year. The first session will convene at Westwood, January 31st and February 1st and 2nd. February 3rd and 4th will be spent at the Fruit Growers' Supply Company's plant at Susanville.

These sessions of the school will be attended by men from the mills in

Idaho, southern Oregon and California.

Following the grading school will be a two week's course on dry kilning at the plant of the Fruit Growers' Supply Company.

This course is in the order of the University extension course and costs each man \$200. The course consists of lectures by three experts of the United States Forestry Department. These lecturers come from the laboratories at Madison, Wisconsin.

14 PER CENT OF OLYMPIC FOREST RAVAGED BY STORM

Tabulated results of the cruise of 22,000 acres of the Olympic "blow down" at the northwest corner, just outside the worst of the damaged area on national forest land, which was made last summer by forest service men and recently submitted to T. T. Munger, forest examiner, show 14 per cent of the original forest to have been destroyed, with 922,000,000 feet left standing and 155,000,000 feet blown down.

That portion on the north fork of the Calawah showed a downed percentage of from 19 to 23; on Beaver creek it ran about 5 per cent, and at Beaver lake, 9 to 20 per cent.

MOONSHINE VANISHED

But Officers Hold Man Accused of Making Liquor

Whether J. J. McManus fled with a missing case of what is declared to have been first-class moonshine, or whether the case of moonshine fled with McManus, is a question the police have been unable to solve; but as he was wanted in connection with the moonshining operations in Mills addition, Sheriff Low and Chief of Police Wilson took him into custody last night in Algoma, and he is in jail now, with his hearing awaiting the return of United States Commissioner Thomas from Portland.

It will be recalled that on January 3, Chief Wilson raided a house in the Mills addition, and in a cache under the floor of a woodshed, found 175 quarts of moonshine, and took into custody Ed Zenders and Dick Berrard. Later this pair waived examination and were taken to Portland to await the action of the federal grand jury.

The arrest of McManus in Algoma last night, comes as a sequel, but in reality his connection with the operation, should be scheduled as a prologue.

It seems that on the evening of January 2, Port Summers, Indian policeman, accompanied by Fred Duke, jitney driver, drove out to McManus' place and allege they found sufficient evidence there to warrant the placing of McManus under arrest, and a case of moon-

shine was taken as evidence. McManus asked permission of the Indian officer to secure suitable clothing in which to array himself before being taken to town. The permission was accorded, and, as the story goes, that was the last seen of McManus, until he was gathered in by Sheriff Low and Chief Wilson in Algoma last night.

The part of the affair, however, which appears to be shrouded in mystery, is the disappearance of the case of moonshine, which Port Summers had seized and placed in the jitney to be used as evidence in the charge against McManus. When the Indian officer and Fred Duke arrived in town they found the case had vanished, just as mysteriously as had the prisoner.

Port Summers reported the state of affairs to Chief Wilson and the next day the latter made the raid which resulted in uncovering one of the biggest caches of moonshine ever discovered in this section and the arrest of Zenders and Berrard.

MOTHER OF ARTHUR WILSON DIES IN PUEBLO, COLO.

Word reached this city today of the death of Mrs. A. G. Wilson, mother of Arthur S. Wilson, of the Wilson Abstract company, who died at Pueblo, Colorado, Tuesday evening at the age of 82. Wilson left here Friday and gained the bedside in time to be recognized. Burial will be at Tekamah where Mr. Wilson's father, at one time a Presbyterian minister, was buried. Mrs. Wilson visited here in 1913 and had many friends in this city.
